Out with the old, in with the new. That tends to be a pretty popular sentiment around this time of year. New Year's Eve is upon us, and as is the custom for many people, it will be a time for new beginnings, new dreams, new goals, and of course, New Year's resolutions. Personally, I don't always make New Year's resolutions. Some years I do, some years I don't. There are other people I know, however, who are more consistent. I have one friend who is so religious about her new year's resolutions, that every year, she types up a document-- usually several pages long-with a list of resolutions that includes short term goals, long term

goals, and an action plan with a clearly laid out time line for how she intends to accomplish and keep her resolutions.

On the other end of the spectrum, I have some friends who are completely opposed to the idea of New Year's resolutions, seeing them as nothing more than frivolous promises that are meant to be broken. These are the people who scoff at the rest of us and our good intentions to eat healthier, read more non-fiction, or finally buckle down and start learning that second language. "Can't teach an old dog new tricks," these folks might say. "What you see is what you get." Most of us, I suspect, fall somewhere between these two extremes. Maybe we like the *idea* of New Year's resolutions. Maybe we have good intentions. But maybe we also don't take them too seriously because we know from experience that our resolve doesn't always last terribly long into the new year.

The truth is, New Year's resolutions can sometimes be frivolous, and they are not usually anything we should lose sleep over. Still, this year, I would like to make an argument in favor of New Year's resolutions. Not necessarily the kind that have to do with losing weight or going to the gym more often-- though those are certainly worthy goals. Rather, I'm talking about the kinds of resolutions we make with the aim of transformation-- with the aim of becoming better people-- kinder, more courageous, more educated, or more compassionate. Resolutions to become more spiritually minded and more devoted to prayer or meditation practices. Resolutions to be less selfish and more giving of our time, our resources, and our hearts. This New Years, let's seek out transformation-based resolutions.

So go ahead and make those resolutions, and know that God is there in the midst of it all. God is there in the midst of who we were, who we are, and who we will become. Old and new. Alpha and Omega. Yesterday, today, and tomorrow.

From the Board of Outreach

Outreach has had a very busy November and December. Through your generosity plus an Outreach match for the first \$400, we were able to present Teen Challenge with \$1033 to continue their wonderful ministry with drug addicts and alcoholics.

With the help of Outreach, the Women's Guild and other volunteers, the Food Pantry was able to put together Thanksgiving dinner baskets with a turkey and all the fixins for 76 needy families in our communities.

Keeping in mind how much we are blessed and how many others are in need of our help, we would like to remind you that this is still the season to keep giving until it feels good!

Our Warmth in Cold places program is ramping up again to donate warm clothing for the homeless and less fortunate in our communities... Anything you can think of from stocking caps to warm socks, and everything in between. Jackets, sweaters, parkas, sweatshirts, pants, long underwear, etc. We will be making a distribution about mid-January and mid-February. Gently used and also new items are appreciated for men, women and children. There are boxes for your donations inside the Church Street entrance and the narthex (front entryway to church).

On 12/20/15, we had a Christmas Fund collection to benefit retired clergy and lay church employees. Pension supplements, help with medical premiums, unexpected emergency costs. If you missed the service, you may still donate via a dedicated donation in the weekly collection plate, or by giving your donation directly to the office with "Christmas Fund" in the memo line. It is never too late to help!

For something new and different this year, we are also partnering with Penelope's Place, a battered women's shelter in Brockton, to provide the women with staple kitchen and bedroom items that will help them to set out on their own and to supplement the items Penelope's Place already has. A list of items needed is included after this message, and on a box in the narthex.
