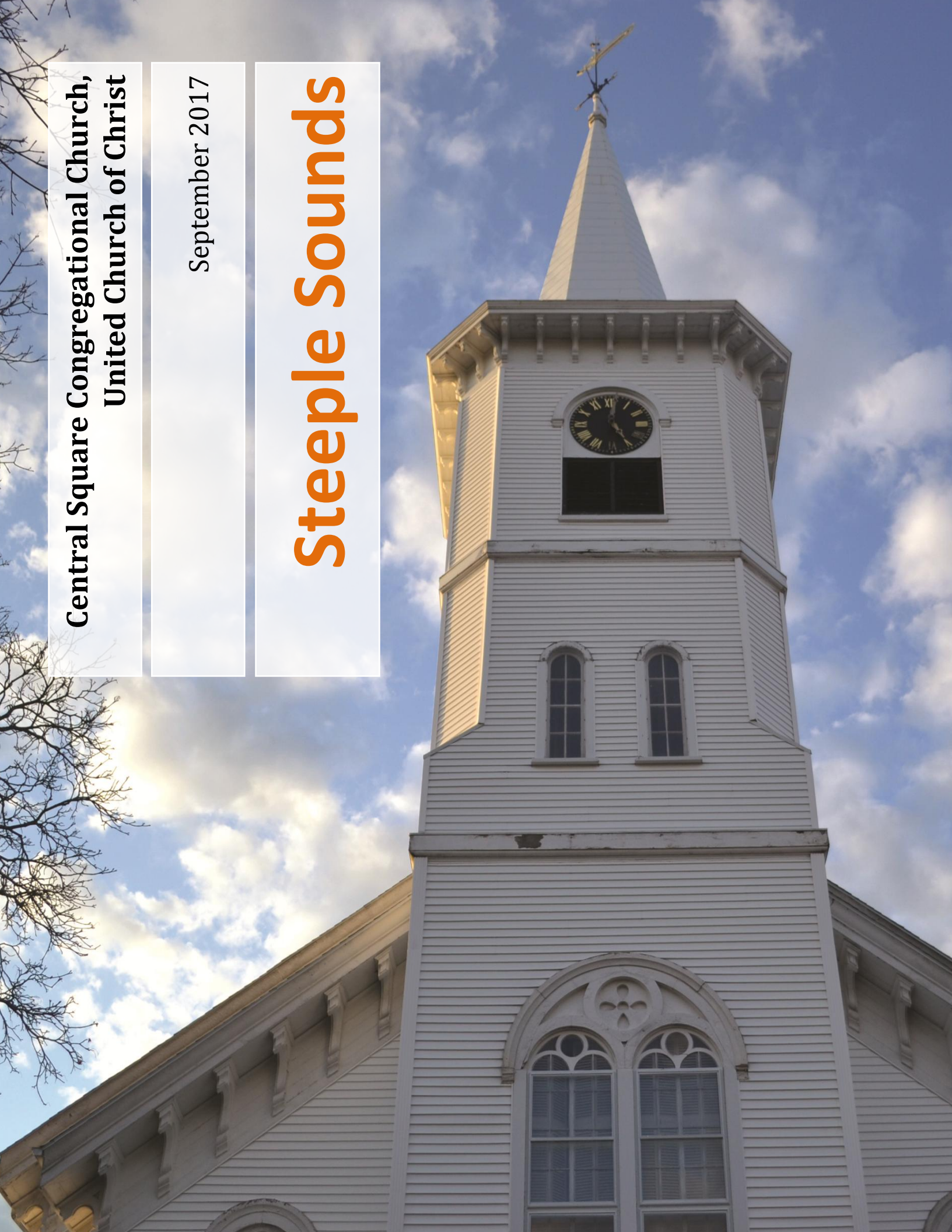

Steeple Sounds



From The Desk of Rev. Beth



The struggle of making a church open and hospitable to all is one that has lasted for millennia. In fact, it was a major source of struggle for the Apostle Paul in about 17 different letters. Thankfully, the Gospels (the books of the Bible which include the life of Jesus) and Epistles (the books of the Bible which were letters written to the early Christian communities) give us some helpful theological tenets for making worship a place where everyone can get a bit of what they need.

This topic arises out of many conversations I've had recently about how to truly be a welcoming community.

This welcoming includes families with young children, as well as people in need of hearing assistance in church while still allowing everyone to hear, focus, and commune with God. At one time or another people on every side have felt unwelcomed, some to the point of leaving church, and that is heartbreaking. Here is my best attempt at guidance on this difficult subject as given by scripture:

1. Worship is more than words and music

It is vital that people who come to worship be able to read and speak the prayers, sing the songs, enjoy the special music, and (if they don't get put to sleep by it) hear the sermon. But all of that, as Paul says in 1 Corinthians 13, is but "a noisy gong or clanging cymbal" if we do not have love. Love in church is not just the words and prayers, but the whole experience. It is being greeted with a smile, having someone help you find a bathroom if you need it, being asked if you need help, having your concerns be remembered, giving of yourself to God and others, and being called by name. We cannot enter worship fully until we have engaged in a forgiving, loving exchange with those around us. God is present more in the people than in the words or music. Thus, if something happens that keeps you from being able to hear or see something, it might help to turn your focus to those around you, give a smile, offer a hand (without offering advice or shushing!). I promise God will be present in those interactions.

2. Just like there are a variety of gifts, there are a variety of needs

A famous passage from Paul is 1 Corinthians 12:14-20: Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot were to say, 'Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body', that would not make it any less a part of the body... If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be?... If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The shadow side of this beautiful description is that each part of the body has different needs in addition to its different gifts. Ears collect earwax; hands need regular washing; feet need their toenails trimmed. So it is that when the different members of the body come to worship, we bring our different needs:

- Children tend to need a bit more movement; adults need to not have their pews kicked by children.

- People for whom English is not a first language or who struggle to hear may need things repeated or translated in a whisper; people who struggle to stay attentive may find those whispers incredibly distracting.
- People whose lives are incredibly stressful may seek peace and quiet; people who are alone all week may be looking forward to engaging in many ways.

We all need to feel loved and accepted as one of God's children. We all need to hear God's Word, to pray, and to sing. So, how to we accommodate all these needs? With God's help, of course, and a lot of grace. But here are some concrete suggestions:

The general rule of worship etiquette is that I can do whatever I want during worship until what I do keeps another person from being able to worship.

- If we whisper loudly, they can't hear.
- If we don't stay in our seat, they can't pay attention to the preacher.
- If we frown at them and their children, they do not feel like God's loved children who are welcome in the sanctuary.
- A cell phone making loud noises will disrupt worship, but a cell phone used to video a song may be a great evangelism tool.
- Parents can't expect all the adults in the room to give up their need to worship to accommodate a disruptive child.
- Non-parent adults can't expect children to not be children in the sanctuary. It takes all of us working together to make worship worshipful for all of us.

3. Engaging the other is at the heart of the Gospel

Above all, God is in the relationships we build. A friend of mine once told me a lesson she learned that, when someone is being really annoying, go and sit next to them. That way, you don't have to look at them, but it also helps you realize quickly how much you have in common. Alternatively, know what your needs are and do what you need to do to meet them in a way that doesn't keep others from being able to worship. If you ever want help thinking through this in your particular situation, I'd love to talk about it with you!

Jesus was very clear in his mission to widen the scope of God's love beyond rules of etiquette. But he also encouraged people to turn all their energy to the love of God and neighbor. If we all keep that as our goal and work to have a forgiving heart when it goes awry, we be the welcoming church of Christ's dreams.

From the Board of Trustees

We are always looking for ways to save the church money. Energy efficiency gains are one way. As a congregation, as individuals and as a nation, we should not underestimate energy efficiency gains as we seek to reduce the effects of climate change.

There are 32 light bulbs in the chandeliers in the sanctuary. Originally fitted with 60 Watt incandescent bulbs many, many years ago, these four chandeliers consumed 1920 watts when they were turned on. About 15 years ago, the incandescents were changed out to compact fluorescents. This reduced the wattage consumed by about 65% to 675, but introduced the possibility of mercury gas release if any of them broke.

As little as 10 years ago, researchers and scientists and engineers were on the cusp of being able to create white light from light emitting diodes (LED's), while still only being able to produce a light blue hue. But give Americans a challenge, and they will succeed.

Today, our 32 light bulbs in the sanctuary are LED (60 watt equivalent) and each one consumes 8 watts. $8 \times 32 = 256$ watts, down from the original 1920. And the cost to do this? One dollar for each bulb – on sale at Home Depot. \$32.

Through a grant from MassSave, we were also able to economically (short payback period) replace the old and troublesome fluorescent lights in Fellowship Hall with LED panels. They are much, much brighter and again, the energy savings is very significant, as these lights are on many more hours per week than the sanctuary chandeliers.

We are currently seeking another grant through MassSave to replace the fluorescent lights in the first floor corridors and in the office with similar LED panel lights. As always, we will look at the payback period as part of our decision, but we will also weigh our responsibility to the future of our and our children's and our grandchildren's planet Earth.

2017 Golf Tournament

This year's Golf Tournament raised just shy of \$10,000.00! What a great fundraiser! 25% of the monies raised will be transferred to the food pantry account. Let me thank everyone who helped us on the committee to raise this money. 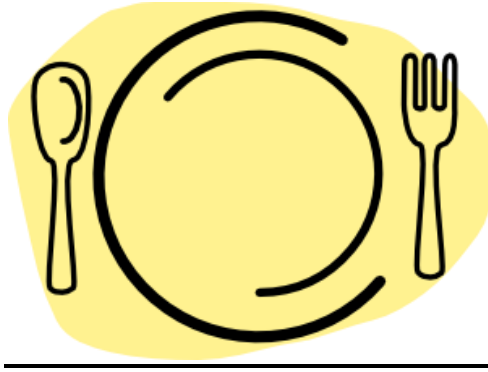

From the Minister of Music

Dear Members of the CSCC Community,

I am honored and excited to begin my new position as Minister of Music at our church. It has been such a joy to provide music for our church for the last five years, and I am delighted to be assuming more of a leadership role in our community.

The fall will bring the return of our choirs, both the talented adult choir and the thriving junior choir. Our adult choir will continue to provide a choral anthem, as well as an introit and a prayer response which bookend our service with different spiritual and musical messages.

As we had begun to do last spring, we will continue to mix music that is more familiar to our congregation with music that is full of new sounds and styles. Our hymnals and our music library have a wealth of music that contains the familiar comfort of tradition, and we will absolutely make use of the wonderful music we already have available to us. We will also continue to perform music that is less expected, taken from many styles, such as African folk music and musical theatre. It is wonderful to hear feedback from members of our congregation who say things such as "I've never heard jazz in church before! That was great!" In reality, composers from every musical genre have composed music that is about God and spirituality, and their voices deserve to be heard!

On our kickoff Sunday, September 10th, I am excited to announce that we will be joined by a guest musician, the renowned operatic tenor Joshua Collier. Josh will be performing four different musical selections for us, including the plaintively evocative "Simple Song" from Leonard Bernstein's Mass.

Speaking of Leonard Bernstein's Mass, we will be forming a musical version of a book club (called Score Club, since "score" is the technical term for a printed piece of music), and our first piece of music that we will be studying is Leonard Bernstein's Mass. If you wish to take part, you will be provided with a score and a recording of this exciting work in advance, and then on Sunday, November 12th, we will meet after the service to discuss the music together. Bernstein's work is not your typical sacred choral work - it has dramatic elements, onstage marching bands and rock bands, and some lyrics by Paul Simon!

I would also like to let everyone know that I am always available to talk to you about how you envision the role of music in our church and in our spiritual lives. I love to take requests for pieces of music you would like to hear. And if you have any interest in joining our adult choir or our children's choir, please let me know!!
