

From The Desk of Rev. Beth



I was at the Better Bean last week (my "drop in hours" are on Wednesdays from 12-2pm) and a member of our church came in to see me. This member relayed to me a story where someone had been really unkind to them in front of a bunch of other people. It was humiliating. And it made me think of the book and movie "Wonder" and some of the wisdom we can gain from that story.

The story "Wonder" is about the difficulties a boy with facial deformities encounters as he enters public school for the first time (as a fifth grader) after being home schooled by his mother until this point. On a daily basis, the boy deals with humiliation in the form of stares, whispers, verbal and physical abuse, simply because he looks different. This story is both heart-wrenching and beautiful at the same time, with many life lessons and a happy ending. I think just about every

fifth grader in Bridgewater has had to read this book, and they have also probably had times in their lives already where people have treated them in a way that has been humiliating.

The theme throughout "Wonder" is to choose kindness. Always. On the one hand, we don't know the personal struggles that others are going through. On the other hand, we choose kindness because kindness breeds kindness.

To the person who came in to talk with me, I reminded them that "Hurt people hurt others; loved people love others." With so much violence and bullying occurring in our society today, it tells me that a lot of people are hurting. It's time for more kindness. Despite our struggles, how we may feel, or how we may be treated by others, we always have the ability to choose our response and to be kind.

My prayer for our community is that we will feel a sense of unity, acceptance, and kindness. May we all choose kindness even during our most difficult struggles, and may we shine light where there is darkness.

With the new Sunday School schedule encouraging our children and youth to participate in worship more often, it is my hope that we will have even more conversations. And it is an even greater hope that our kids will find their Auntie Veras in us.

From the Board of Trustees

I have been thinking recently about what we do when we want to offer support to others. When someone is sick, injured, or having difficulties we often ask them "let me know if you need anything" or "let me know what I can do to help". Unfortunately, it is often difficult for the person you are trying to assist to ask, even though you have offered. Some say that the person needing help should not feel bad about asking once the assistance has been offered and that those looking to help just don't know what is needed. Others will say that if you want to offer someone assistance or comfort, to be specific in the hopes that will make it less awkward. In truth, we know it is difficult to ask for help and it is also very hard to know what someone else may need. I think the only way to work through this is to have deeper conversations and better communication around what is going on.

While our Church isn't sick, help is needed to keep it running while providing support and comfort to our community. The Trustees are charged with the finances and maintenance of the Church and the congregation has offered support. Now, we need to ensure there is open communication on what support is needed and what is being offered.

Most already know from last month's Steeple Sounds that we have a budget with a significant deficit. What many may not realize is what is included in the spending for the budget. Entering the building you may notice the peeling paint in the sanctuary but you won't easily see the missing shingles on the roof or the crumbling mortar in the chimneys.

From Christian Outreach

Happy Autumn! The Christian Outreach Committee would like to invite and welcome everyone to Central Square Congregational Church! It's been a very hot and humid summer. It still went by way too fast though!

The Christian Outreach Committee is co-chaired by Rob Basler and Bill O'Neil. Other members include Connie Chandler, Kim Wallace, Jasvir MacIntosh, and David Hanson.

As a UCC church, Central Square is dedicated to the Big 5 programs. October is Neighbors in Need month, and there will be a special collection offering on Sunday, October 7th.

I would guess that most everyone has signed up for the no-call list on their land line. And most likely you still get all kinds of sales calls and scan calls. I don't know many groups or organizations out there asking for donations. At Hanson Farm we get hundreds of fundraising calls being a business and not being on the no-call list. If you make a donation to just one of them, you get calls from a dozen more. Boy are they persistent! Sure as shooting they will call again next year.

Most of these people who are calling are being paid for their time. I've been told by the Bridgewater Police that it could be as much as 70%. This money never gets to the organization that hired the fundraiser. As I see it, there are several solutions for this:

The first is not to donate at all even if it is a deserving group.

The second is to donate directly to the organization. Locally most service groups can accept donations directly. The Police and Fire departments both have funds that benefit the community directly. Veterans groups and American Legion can take donations without going through a fundraiser. I'm sure there are others, too.

The third solution, and the one that makes Central Square so inviting, is volunteering. People giving of their time is so vital and a big part of our church. Sure, it takes time and sometimes it's hard to find that time, but once you see the results of your efforts - all the good that's being done – it makes you feel like a million bucks!

CSCC Cabinet Meeting -- Minutes September 19, 2018

To be reviewed and approved at the next cabinet meeting

Meeting called to order at 7:08

Cabinet members in attendance: Reverend Beth Stotts, Pastor; Diane Sheibley, Moderator; Mark Sorgman, Vice Moderator; Dave Sheibley, Treasurer; Anne Malmquist, Board of Deacons; John Sharland, Board of Trustees; Brad Barnsley, Board of Stewardship; Bill O'Neil and Rob Basler, Board of Christian Outreach; Lisa Masiello, Board of Christian Education; Mike Bundock and Gail Wershing, Growth Committee; Ellen Crawford, Music Committee; Gail Wright, Women's Guild and Fellowship

Minutes from the June meeting were reviewed. Anne Malmquist motioned that they be accepted. Mike Bundock seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Pastor's Report - Rev. Beth Stotts

Reverend Beth distributed her written report. She returned from parental leave (7/14/18) and met with the Auxiliary Pastor to debrief. Met with families to discuss baptisms, funerals, etc. Prepared fall book study book "Inspired" by Rachel Held Evans. Organized 3rd Annual Music Alley Worship. Worked with Moderator to begin think-tanking ideas around the need for Youth Ministry. Visited similar congregations in our conference with vibrant youth programs, and interviewed youth ministers and leaders on their organizational structure. Report was submitted to Board of Christian Education. Rev Beth will be meeting with 5th to 8th grade youth on a monthly basis for youth group activities.

Rev. Beth read letter that will be sent out to congregation about changes in worship format to include children in worship on a more regular basis. Focus to be on more intergenerational worship services. Sunday school classes will be seasonal.

Diane met with Mass Conference Youth Minister Coordinator and members of CE, mission trip, and interested congregants.

Treasurer's Report (Treasurer did not arrive at meeting until later)

Noted by Diane that the format was different. Rev Beth questioned why "Our Church's Wider Mission" collection was not taken allowing CSCC to not qualify for "5 for 5 Giving" to the Conference. After discussion, it was determined that the Board of Christian Outreach missed this collection because it is not assigned a specific date. Outreach will coordinate with the Treasurers to see how it was done in the past. John Sharland mentioned his attempt to combine conference dues with OCWM that may have made this process easier. Budget deficit was mentioned. We will not revisit redoing the budget. How can we make up the deficit?

Deacons - Anne Malmquist

Parish care deacon is getting a group together for visitation. Pastor Erin led a workshop. Deacons are working to get the program up and running. What does it mean to be a member of CSCC (such as paying conference dues) was discussed at Deacons' meeting. Also discussed how worship will look different with changes of more intergenerational services.

Trustees - John Sharland

Two trustees (Gordon Brailsford and Tom Struzik) resigned. Reorganizational meeting was held August 29. John Sharland is Chair; Ed MacIntosh is Vice Chair; Ed Buckland is secretary; Paul Christiansen, member.

Regarding portfolios, John and Ed M are buildings and grounds; Paul works with finances and treasurers; Ed B deals with contracts.

Roof: Kevin Bean did estimate on steeple area; estimate is needed on shingle area near peak. Does not appear to be water damage.

Chimneys: one has bad top (\$6500 repair est) neither is lined; limestone mortar which crumbles. "Chimney Chap" will give estimate to rebuild from flashing up

No info on status of grant application (Brian Pffeifer.)

Ceiling in closet near basement area appears to be water damaged. Ceiling will be taken down and observed for a few months to see exactly where water is coming in. John noted that our insurance company expects us to maintain the property.

Discussion of furniture being brought into building. Trustees created a form for donations other than cash. This should be submitted and approved before item is brought into building.

Rev Beth noted that Rich Sullivan has ordered mini ramps to be installed over thresholds entering sanctuary to make for smoother mobility.

Stewardship - Brad Barnsley

The committee of two would like to invite Rev Beth and Diane to their October 2nd meeting for input as to how to move forward.

Reminder that new pledge season has started. EFT giving is preferred over envelopes.

Asked for additions to "time and talent" form.

No dates on envelopes so that they can be used any time; may make special offerings confusing. Members like to know in advance of special offerings.

Christian Education - Lisa Masiello

In the process of church school registration. Only 4 or 5 families participated. In light of registration being low and the volunteer situation, offerings will be more seasonal. For example, December focuses on pageant; January on Heifer. Support is needed for nursery. Revamping "busy bags" for sanctuary. Designing a flyer for new families with small children. CE will be hosting more "Friends and Family Fun Nights," such as game night (Sept 22), Pumpkin carving (Oct 28), and Advent workshop (Dec 1). A meeting about the mission trip is coming up on Sept 30. Possible flashlight corn maze on October 20. Anne noted that the youth mission trip chaperones have some ideas from the youth as to activities they are interested in. Next board meeting is October 10.

Christian Outreach - Bill O'Neil and Rob Basler

Five thousand pounds of food were picked up from New Bedford. Volunteers will be helping out with distribution and sorting, as Jack Melcher is recuperating from surgery. Roche Bros and Cumberland Farms continue to make donations, as well as Dave Hanson and Bridgewater Prison. The Saturday Brockton homeless mission is seeking folks to volunteer at the shelter for overnights as the weather gets colder. Will coordinate with CE and youth group for other ways for youth to be involved.

Music - Ellen Crawford

Senior choir began rehearsal and singing in worship September 9th. Children's choir has started rehearsals and will sing in worship September 23rd.

Growth - Mike Bundock and Gail Wershing

Growth will represent CSCC at Bridgewater Autumnfest being held September 29. They will hand out coupons for free breakfast and will raffle a large, hand-made puppet. Also plans to include coupon for free breakfast with welcome packet.

Growth committee designed a plan to handle Coffee Hour responsibility in a different way. The plan teams up two committees or boards for 2 months. The idea is for one individual to sign up and be responsible for one Sunday between October 7 and June 30, calling upon others on their "team" for help as needed. There was a long discussion around this suggestion. Mark Sorgman reminded us that the Deacons had been relieved of coffee Hour responsibilities at the June cabinet meeting due to their heavy responsibilities with each worship service. Other questions were raised as to numbers of people on each team, etc. Anne suggested a voluntary sign-up like had been used in the summer months, but Gail said it was difficult to fill all the Sundays. It was also mentioned that "Breakfast Sundays" are easier to host since the coffee is already made and there are left over goodies. Without completely resolving the issue, the sign-up sheet was sent around, and the Sundays through October have been covered.

Diane suggested that we take the board and committee designations out of the process altogether, and just ask everyone on all the boards and committees (except Deacons) to sign up for one Sunday to chair the coffee hour process. Mission youth families could be used to possibly fill in the holes in the schedule, and the groups that use our church (boy scouts, girl scouts, BSU Choir, Masons—who have hosted before) have been approached to also participate.

Women's Guild and Fellowship - Gail Wright

October 3rd is the welcome back and welcome new members pot luck meeting. October 20th is the Fall rummage sale. Gail Wright motioned to have a 50/50 raffle at both the fall and the spring rummage sales, and it was approved unanimously. November's meeting will be a demonstration from the "Dressing a Girl Around the World" organization.

Other Business

- * Opportunity Fair: Is the Opportunity Fair still relevant? Most boards and committees said yes! Diane suggested having hand-outs, and making their presentations interactive. Opportunity Fair scheduled for 9/23 and 9/30.
- * Reminder that boards and committees are charged with coordinating certain tasks, but are encouraged to ask others to help out. Bring people in for "bits and pieces."
- * Diane, on behalf of the Fair Committee, asked for approval for a "Big Ticket" raffle item, pick-a-prize raffles, and 50/50 raffle at this year's fair in November. Motion to accept by Bill O'Neil, seconded by Rev Beth. Approved unanimously.
- * Diane noted that the meeting had gone long and we had yet to get into a discussion about the budget / youth minister / fundraising, but said it would be taken up next month. In the meantime, all are asked to give that topic some thought and how to make some inroads into making up the approved budget deficit for the year.
