You guys. Seriously. When looking back on 2019, this text exchange was without a doubt one of the highlights of my year. You know that New Year's song "Auld Lang Syne"? Do you know what that means?

The Scottish phrase "auld lang syne" literally translates to "old long since," and basically means, "days gone by." Sometimes we forget that even people who aren't in our midst anymore are still impacted by us. Or that "days gone by" should be remembered and honored.

If we do nothing else in this new year, let's take a cue from a college student, think of the "days gone by", and reach out to someone who changed or impacted our lives and thank them. As we ring in a new year, drink a toast to them and to the days gone by with gratitude!

**Baby products** – diapers, wipes, pull-ups, onesies, underwear



# **ENDING HUNGER ENRICHING LIVES**

The mission of "Community Food Packaging" is to feed the underserved in communities who suffer from food insecurity, with a focus on those who hunger in Plymouth County, the South Shore, and beyond.

Depending on how far out the donors and volunteers come from, the meals that are packaged on the Friday and Saturday before Thanksgiving will go that far and wide. 8 of our top 16 counties are within an hour of Abington. This year, those 8 counties packaged over half of our meals (or more than the other 59 counties in New England combined)!

In September, Mary and Brad Barnsley, Ginny Young, and I participated in the food packaging event at Bridgewater State University. It was fun besides being an opportunity to help hungry people, even those who visit the food bank housed in our own church. Have you seen the boxes of food that occasionally appear in the back hall or in the Fellowship Hall? Those are from Outreach Inc., which is a result of the BSU and Abington food packaging events! 


### **Community Book Study**

### A Reminder of Our Policy on Delay or Cancellation of Worship Services Due to Acts of Nature

The Chair of the Board of Deacons (BOD) in conjunction with the Senior Pastor will discuss the need and reason for cancellation of worship service. Upon the decision to cancel worship service the following procedures shall be put into effect:

- 1. The Pastor will notify the Music Director no later than 6am the Sunday morning of the service in question. The Music Director will in turn notify the choir.
- 2. The Pastor will notify the Sexton and other staff, including the Congregational Administrator.
- 3. The Congregational Administrator will update the office answering machine with the cancellation announcement, notify the appropriate television media, send a general church email, and update the website and Facebook page.
- 4. The chair of the BOD will notify the Moderator and Vice Moderator and the other members of the BOD.

The main factors used to decide a cancellation of worship are:

- 1. Excessive amounts of snow
- 2. Parking availability (or parking ban)
- 3. Damage to the church
- 4. State of Emergency
- 5. Power Outage

# CSCC Cabinet Meeting – Minutes December 18, 2019 \*\*\* DRAFT – TO BE APPROVED AT THE NEXT CABINET MEETING \*\*\*

Meeting called to order at 7:02

Rev. Beth led an opening Christmas devotional.

Cabinet members in attendance: Rev. Beth Stotts, Pastor; Anne Malmquist, Moderator; Gordon Brailsford, Board of Trustees; Jessica Stearns, Director of Christian Education; Diane Glass, Board of Deacons; Bill O'Neil, Board of Christian Outreach; Brad Barnsley & Rob Basler, Board of Stewardship; Terry Reynolds, Women's Guild and Fellowship.

Minutes from the November meeting were reviewed but not voted on because there was not a quorum.

**Pastor's Report** – Rev. Beth Stotts circulated her report. Discussion was raised about handicap accessible parking. A request was made for the street parking on Church Street (between the Verizon lot and the common) to be kept available on Sunday mornings to those with accessibility issues. Rob Basler said he'd let the breakfast crew know. Rev. Beth said she'd ask Ellen to send out an all church email asking folks to park in the library lot, on the common, or farther on down Church Street.

Treasurer's Report – circulated and reviewed.

**Historical Church Building Committee** – Terry Reynolds noted that they presented our grant application to the town's Historical Preservation Committee. They won't hear back from the town until January at the earliest.

**Vitality Committee** – Rob Basler shared updates from their minutes. The team met and put together questions that they would like to ask the congregation in the month of January. Each week two questions will be posed to the congregation so that people can begin talking about their ideas for church vitality.

**Board of Stewardship** – Rob Basler shared that Stewardship will be partnering with the Vitality Committee to move forward with the answers from the vitality questionnaire. Rob Basler also reported that CSCCUCC is sponsoring both the Christmas Eve and the Christmas Day meals at Mainspring House.

Board of Trustees – Gordon Brailsford reported that the window was repaired. Trash pickup is a mess right now but Ellen is figuring it out. Trustees authorized Rich to get a new vacuum cleaner. The computer for the bells up behind the old choir loft needs to be kept clear! Gordon is going to see about creating a sign or something to keep people from putting storage around the computer. We have been having a foul smell between the downstairs bathrooms and the kitchen. Trustees hope that cleaning the grease trap will solve the problem. Gordon crawled under the church building and does not believe that it is sewage because the pipes run toward the common, not out toward Church St. Trustees are going to put LED lights in the boiler room and two new lights near the far corner of the Fellowship Hall (by that little room under the stairs). The Congregation approved \$62,000 for HCBC. Trustees report that they are over. \$40,860 was the first invoice, the second invoice was \$17,500, retainer for the engineer was \$7,700. Terry Reynolds said that the retainer will go toward the full amount. Trustees intend to put together a separate account for the restoration. Gordon also reported that the Treasurer and Asst. Treasurer are getting rid of the old computers in the Treasurer's Office. They will be disposed of appropriately.

**Board of Christian Outreach** – January 21 will be the distribution date for Warmth in Cold Places. The food in Fellowship Hall will stay there for a few weeks. Handwarmers/footwarmers/etc. needed.

### **Moderator Anne Malmquist -**

- Opportunity Fair in January is being cancelled. January's focus should be on the vitality study and the Heifer program.
- Annual reports are due January 15.
- Diane is stepping down from planning the golf tournament. What do we want to do now? Terry Reynolds would like to put in a vote for returning to Scotland Links instead of the Back Nine Club. She said Brett Wright would be willing to help organize and that he and his buddies would prefer Scotland Links. Those in attendance asked Gordon (who works at Scotland Links) to look into securing a Friday or Monday date in June of 2020.
- CSCC is now a member of the Southern New England Conference since the Massachusetts Conference joined together with Connecticut and Rhode Island Conferences. Because of this, we need to update our constitution and bylaws to reflect this. Should we also use this as an opportunity to review our current bylaws and the board and committee structure? Bill O'Neil said that we shouldn't have term limits or term requirements. Open discussion about the history of why term limits were needed was brought up. One thought is if there is honest discussion about vitality and leadership, then there wouldn't be a need for term limits. "It's Holy Spirit vs. the bylaws." Rob Basler added, "If someone is called to a certain ministry, why would we limit that?"
- There was a non-voting consensus that we are putting the Nominating Committee on hold until the Vitality Team reports in early March. At that point we'll review bylaws and discern moving forward with Nominating Committee from there.

**Board of Christian Education** – Jess Stearns noted the gift-wrapping fundraiser is this Saturday, 12/21, to benefit the youth mission trip. Volunteers are needed to help wrap. Sunday is the pageant. Rob, Brad, and Bill are erecting the stable on the chancel steps. Jess is taking vacation December 25-January 6.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:15.
