

From The Desk of Rev. Beth



"For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth..."
-Isaiah 65:17

This morning, as I walked out to my car to come to the office, I hopped over puddles and worms and noticed some gnats swarming over a particularly muddy patch of last year's grass. With new eyes, I'm beginning to see parts of our property that I haven't really looked at in months. I'm also noticing the downed branches, hunks of turf, and piles of rock and sand scooped by our snow plow guy during the first little storm when the ground wasn't frozen yet. I see BSU students walking through Bridgewater center shedding their winter

layers. Some already venture out to class in sandals and shorts. Even though my mother's voice echoes "You're making me cold!" in my brain when I see them, I admire their bravado. They understand this truth: Forty-five degrees feels cold in October. In late April and early May, it feels delicious; a promise that spring really is here and summer is coming.

The calendar tells us that we are in Spring. Our senses tell us that winter is trying to hang on. When I read the words of Isaiah 65, the lavish description of God's dream for new heaven and new earth, I am reminded of the season in which we find ourselves right now. We haven't quite made it to the summer of creation. No, we are earlier in the verse. We are at the "God is about to create" part. What this means is that we are somewhere after the beginning but not quite at the end of the process of creating. We are getting ready. In the phrase "for I am about to create", we are at the "about" part.

The past few months of worship have been about telling the stories from the midst of Jesus' ministry-how he gathered coworkers, what he taught, where he had conflict. We took the time to watch Jesus be about God's business of building the kingdom. We were invited to consider what it means for us to be about God's business in our own day and time. We were invited to think about how we enact our faith. And, we were invited to remember repentance, to take seriously what is turning us away from God, and prayerfully work to turn back towards God's grace and love. And now, we are in the midst of the "about".

It is no small thing to be in this "about" season. It's sticky, messy, and full of things once covered up by the snow. But, even in the midst of the muck, there is potential. God is about to build a new creation. It will always be on the foundation of what has come before.

And so, in the midst of the "about", what new life is about to be born in you? What has this season been preparing you to build with God? As you stand in the muck and mud of the "about to" time, what is sustaining you through to new creation? Our scripture tells us that new life is coming. If it doesn't feel like Resurrection, it just means God's not done yet. That means we still have time to pitch in and become good fruits of the next growing season.



From the Board of Trustees

We have begun preparing a draft budget for fiscal year 2019-2020. We will be finalizing it at our April 24th meeting at 7:00 pm in the Fireplace Room. Guests are always welcome at our meetings. The draft budget will be submitted to Cabinet for the May meeting for approval. You, the members of the church, will be voting on it at the Annual Budget Meeting on June 9th.

Necessarily, we (the Trustees) will be using last year's total income of \$169,500 as our starting point for the new budget. This is because we have no indication that member giving will show an increase over last fiscal year. This will result in a deficit budget. The budget deficit that you, the members of the church, passed last June was \$38,000. This included a \$15,000 salary for a Youth minister. That money was not expended in fiscal 2018-2019 because the hire did not occur. So, at the upcoming June Budget Meeting, you will see a smaller actual deficit, more on the order of \$12,000-\$15,000 for the fiscal 2018-2019 period.

However, in the mean time, a job description has been created and a job posting made for the Youth minister. The job posting is out there now. So, the trustees must assume that all or some of the \$15,000 salary for that position will be expended in fiscal 2019-2020. The trustees will decide at our April 24th meeting, upon advice from Rev. Beth, who is receiving any applications and would thus have any information about actual start date for the hire, how much of the \$15,000 salary to include in the new budget.

Projecting then – with salary increases for the three paid positions and the requisite additional benefits and taxes and some other budget requests, - a deficit of somewhere between \$15,000 and \$38,000 can be envisioned. We have weathered many a "teens figure" deficit in the past, but that larger one is a little scary, at least to this prudent man.

The good news/bad news – for the last two or three years, we have not included any planned withdrawals from endowment earnings to either reduce the deficit or balance the budget – yes, we did have one year in the last few with a balance budget. That's the good news. The bad news is that it looks like we will need to specify a dollar amount to be taken in fiscal 2019-2020 from endowment earnings and/or available "sale of the parsonage" money to minimize the deficit.

We welcome your thoughts, comments and prayers over the next few weeks.

Women's Guild & Fellowship

One night this past November, three women spoke at the women's guild meeting and shared their story of how they were providing dignity for women, and especially girls, by sewing them a dress. A simple dress pattern is all that was needed. During the presentation, the guild members were invited to either take home a pattern and material to make a dress, or they could come to one of the workshops and sew a dress. Some of the members have participated both at home and at one or more of the monthly workshops. These dresses have become part of the program "Dress a Girl Around the World".


An idea was presented to the Women's Guild to join forces with Outreach and the Sunday School. The purpose would be to create two different zip lock baggies, one to supply essential needs and the other was to be filled with food. Armed with donations from the Guild, two of our Guild members joined Outreach, and the children who made sandwiches and put together several bags to meet the needs of many homeless people in Brockton.

The Guild received an urgent message regarding the loss former members of CSCC, Butch and Barbara Alden suffered due to flooding of their South Carolina home. Only a shell of a house remained. As a result, The Guild rallied and sent a gift to help them. They used our gift to purchase a new stove. We received a message from Penelope's Place, a home for women who are victims of abuse, stating they were in need of several items for mothers and their children. We asked the congregation to help, and we combined our contributions, and brought them to the shelter.

Many other causes were close to our hearts this year. At Christmas, we sent many boxes of needed goods off to the troops overseas. We also thought about the animal shelter in Brockton and collected many items to make the dogs, cats and other animals more comfortable while waiting for a permanent home. Emergency kits were created from items collected from the congregation and the Guild. These kits were sent to Church World Services, and would help people who face disasters due to storms.

Our year ends in May. We thank all who have contributed to our many causes. We also look forward to continue working with various groups in the congregation and continuing to serve people locally and abroad.

CSCC Cabinet Meeting – Minutes April 17, 2019 *** DRAFT ***

To be reviewed and approved at the next Cabinet meeting

Meeting called to order at 7:05

Cabinet members in attendance: Rev. Beth Stotts, Pastor; Diane Sheibley, Moderator; Dave Sheibley, Treasurer; Larry Brown, Asst. Treasurer; Kathleen Mosher, Clerk; Anne Malmquist, Board of Deacons; John Sharland, Board of Trustees; Lisa Masiello, Board of Christian Education; Rob Basler, Board of Christian Outreach; Ellen Crawford, Music Committee; Terry Reynolds, History & Memorials Committee & Women's Guild and Fellowship; Gail Wershing and Mike Bundock, Growth Committee; Barbara Morey, Historical Renovations Committee

Minutes from the March meeting were reviewed. Gail Wershing motioned to accept the minutes as amended. Anne Malmquist seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Pastor's Report- Rev. Beth Stotts

We're in the depth of Holy Week. The bulletins are being done for tomorrow and Friday. The Good Friday program will be full of prayer, scripture, and music. Death and Coffee will be held on Saturday. Sunrise Service will be at Hanson Farm Sunday morning. There will be a Mom's group once a month. We are continuing to search for CE and Nursery directors. Ellen and Troy will be leading a book study on June 8th with Reverend Beth. The book is "Learning to Walk in the Dark" by Barbara Brown Taylor. Rev. Beth will be on retreat April 23rd-27th. There will be a guest preacher the Sunday after Easter.

Treasurer's Report- David Sheibley

We are 79% through the fiscal year. Offerings are at 82% of the budget so we are a bit ahead. Expenses are on track for where we expected. We're in pretty good shape.

Board of Deacons' Report- Anne Malmquist

Barbara Morey did a wonderful presentation Sunday night on the holy land. The visitation group is going along well.

Board of Trustees' Report- John Sharland

Many things were discussed during the March meeting. There will be quarterly draws from the investment account to cover deficits. The shutters and carpets are under further discussion for updating.

Board of Christian Education- Lisa Masiello

There will be a pot luck this Friday (Good Friday). Nine families have signed up. Sunday school calendar has three more Sunday School dates: 4/28, 5/19, 6/9 is Children's Sunday. It is getting to be near the end of the year so things are wrapping up. There will be a Taco 'bout the Stars event on May 4.

Board of Christian Outreach- Rob Basler

Jasvir MacIntosh is leaving the committee as she has too much on her plate right now. The Saturday Brockton homeless mission is ongoing. The support from the church is much appreciated. The meal for MainSpring House is next week. There will be monthly focus spots to keep the church informed with what Outreach is up to. Outreach will be trying to get the youth more involved in various projects, mini missions, camping, and serving seniors.

Music Committee- Ellen Crawford

There have been some discussions about financial matters. A choir concert is being planned for a future date.

History and Memorials Committee- Terry Reynolds & Barbara Morey

The flowers have been purchased for Easter Sunday. Any flowers left will be delivered during visits. Contractors are being contacted to give estimates for the historical restoration work and one is coming tomorrow. We need estimates for the grant application. If we can prove a historical event happened inside the church, we can get funds to renovate the sanctuary as well, otherwise we'll need to stick to the outside work with the CPA town grant. The steeple is not covered since it is a religious symbol. We are looking into other grants to fund that.

Growth Committee- Gail Wershing and Mike Bundock

Mike mentioned that the Growth budget is being used for things without their consent. Growth needs to ok those expenditures in the future. There will be a community concert on May 19th at Music Alley. Julia and Tom Struzik will be performing. Gail mentioned that the Easter mailing had gone out and some of the cabinet members received a copy in the mail. Coffee hour will be hosted differently next year, and Growth is hoping all boards and committees will participate. Coffee taste testing is still ongoing. It was noted that some time ago, the church decided it wanted to only serve fair trade coffee, so that should be kept in mind. There was a discussion about being a green church and how we need to follow through on that, such as not using any Styrofoam.

Women's Guild & Fellowship- Terry Reynolds

The Women's Guild hosted the collation for the Wershing/Sheibley funeral. The rummage sale was very successful. Their last meeting of the year is on May 1, and it will be their banquet.

Nominating Committee

There was no one in attendance to give their final report. Diane asked if there was any objection to reviewing their report by email once it's submitted, for the purpose of approving it prior to the election meeting in May. There were no objections.
