As the summer draws to a close, as our community prepares for the start of the academic year, as our children go back to school, or off to college, as we welcome new people into our midst and send off beloved friends, as we celebrate the beauty and bounty of the earth and as we lament pain and injustice both near and far, there is a particular word I have been thinking about, particularly when it comes to doing: BLESS.


There are many definitions of the word bless, but here is one I like: To make holy, to consecrate. To hold in reverence.

In religious and secular culture, we too often hear a spoken or implicit connection between blessing and reward, whether that be the blessing of health, wealth, security, opportunity, etc. Too little emphasis is given to the opportunities we have to do the blessing, to recognize the mundane and momentous moments, objects, and people as holy and hold them in reverence. And yet, the opportunities are all around us. And as church, what better way to be doers of the Word!

Blessing is something that we can do in any time and any place. We can say a blessing over a sink full of dirty dishes, thanking God for these vessels that held the food that nourished people. We can say a blessing as we park our cars, giving thanks for a safe arrival. We can bless one another. In Puerto Rican culture, it is a tradition that children greet elders with the word "Bendición" to which the elder replies "Que Dios te bendiga." The child literally asks for a blessing, and is met with the words "God bless you."

As we consider this Fall how to be doers of the word, let us also ask how in our daily living we are given opportunities to bless others and to bless the world around us. And we can start here: as you read the pages of this newsletter, whether it is a paper copy in your hands or a document on your computer screen, I invite you to offer a blessing over the words you read, the people who wrote them, and the ministries they describe. May the many opportunities to serve, build up community, witness to one another and the world, and know God more deeply and fully, be a blessing in your life as well.

Congregational Meeting

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 24, 11:15am
In person and livestreaming

One item of business will be conducted on this day: **“The Trustees of CSCC recommend to the congregation via the Cabinet that CSCC withdraw the application to the town of Bridgewater for CPC funds for CSCC. Further, the Trustees recommend the Historical Church Building Committee be dissolved.”**

The motion was approved by Cabinet on June 21, 2023, by majority vote.

No other business matters will be voted on at this meeting, unless presented in writing to the Moderator prior to the meeting. That business will be added to the agenda ONLY after an affirmative vote by 2/3 of the attending-voting members.

All church members are requested to attend. Voting will take place in person and online. Online voting link will be posted on cscucc.org on Thursday, September 21. All voting concludes at 9am on Monday, September 25.

From the minutes of the Cabinet meeting of June 21: “It has been a long and difficult process, and it is a constant state of going in circles. They awarded us money for phase 1 [of the restoration of the church building], but have delayed the disbursement of those funds with legal matters, and not providing us the agreements necessary to close the deal. And there will be restrictions placed on our building which we may or may not be able to comply with in the longterm, with no guarantees for money for phases 2 & 3.

The Trustees wish to offer a huge thank you to the members of the HCRC for their persistence, patience, and hard work in trying to see this process to fruition.”



CSCC Cabinet Meeting – Minutes August 16, 2023 at 7pm

The meeting was called to order at 7:03 by Anne Malmquist, Moderator.

Cabinet members in attendance: Anne Malmquist, Moderator; Rev. Beth Stotts, Pastor; David Sheibley, Treasurer; Diane Sheibley, Clerk; Krissy Cannizzo & Terry Reynolds, Community Engagement Team; Carol Chaffee, Congregational Engagement Team; John Sharland & Mark Sorgman, Property and Finance Team; Eric Stotts, Spiritual Engagement Team.

Additional attendees: Jane O'Connell

Diane Sheibley took attendance. Quorum was met.

June Minutes

The meeting minutes from the June meeting were presented and reviewed. John Sharland motioned to accept the minutes as written; Carol Chaffee seconded. The minutes were approved as written.

Pastor's Report – Rev. Beth Stotts

Rev. Beth called attention to the projects she has been working on: Uke camp (big success!), Dr. Mary Lou Gifford's visit to preach, planning for the Fall, pastoral visits, 3 funerals, 2 upcoming weddings. Worship this Sunday will be in Music Alley, and there are 6 people who have expressed interest in performing music. She is having surgery on 8/31, and will be recovering for at least a few days after. Sunday, 9/3 will be a "hymn sing Sunday" as she will not be able to preach. 9/10 is kickoff and communion worship. And the whole month will be "congregational engagement" month. There will be a bbq and picnic after worship on 9/10.

She spent several days dealing with a paperwork misunderstanding with the Secretary of State's office, regarding her credentials in being able to perform weddings. It's all straightened out now.

Treasurer's Report – David Sheibley

Dave reported that things are going OK. It was a pretty good giving month last month for the middle of summer, which was especially helpful since the month prior was not a good one. Dave asked about the lawnmowing. There was talk of having gotten a lawnmower for the church, but the landscaping company is still coming and charging us \$50 per mow. Jenne will be asked to inquire with them if they would be willing to donate their services. We could give them a donation letter to acknowledge their gift.

Community Engagement Team Report – Krissy Cannizzo and Terry Reynolds

The team hasn't met yet, they were waiting to meet with Anne. They will arrange a time to meet soon.

Congregational Engagement Team Report – Carol Chaffee

The team has had two meetings, and they are formulating ideas and plans. September will be the month to get folks to sign up for what they'd like to do, and the Team will be organizing a talent bank. They will be looking to build a list of how people can serve the church without a big commitment.

Property & Finance Team – John Sharland

The team had their initial meeting last week. Among their goals, they need to form a "stewardship" team. Carol and Kathleen expressed their interest in continuing participation in that work. Our sexton Rich is moving to Plymouth at some point, so we need to find a new sexton. The position is 15 hours a week at \$17/hour. Rev. Beth has reached out to Anna Combs, who has filled in for Rich when he has been on vacation in the past. The team will meet monthly on the second Wednesday of the month.

Spiritual Engagement Team – Rev. Beth

The team met on 6/28. They went through the member and visitor lists, and prayed over them. Eric is working on Kids Church [more later].

Building Project/Congregational Meeting – Anne Malmquist

At the June Cabinet meeting, it was proposed and approved that we should withdraw our application for CPC funds from the town to fix our building. The annual meeting to get the congregation's approval is set for 9/24. In summary of the reasons: * they are asking for too many restrictions that we may not even be able to keep up with; * there is no guarantee of any monies in addition to the steeple money they have verbally granted; * we cannot get specific information on the grant details or the deed restriction.

Kids Church – Eric Stotts

Eric noted that they're still looking for some teachers. Kids church begins 9/10. Rev. Beth worked on the details of a service project trip for next summer. It will be an intergenerational trip, in partnership with the Dover church. They send 80 people to Maine each summer the last week of June, typically.

Team Emails – Eric Stotts

Eric has set up a gmail account for each team, so that all communications can be kept in one place over time, for smooth transition to new members, as well as a central place of reference. The folders of documents can be shared between people or other teams. The team email addresses will also make it easy for people in the congregation and the community to communicate with the teams without singling out specific team leaders, or having to know who they are or how to get in touch with them. It does require someone on each team to be regularly checking the email box and responding accordingly.

Fundraising Plan – Anne Malmquist

Anne explained the need to have a plan to make up the budget deficit. It needs to be a laid out, thought through plan of fundraising with dates, projects, and dollars. The P&F team will find a few people to head up a fundraising plan.

Bridgewater Downtown Revitalization Plan

Carol noted that she went to a presentation at the library for new proposals to fix up the downtown area of Bridgewater. They are gathering information in preparation for their presentation on Sept. 26. Maybe we should invite him to the church to present the plans to our congregation, since anything affecting the common affects us as a church.

Other business

- Krissy called attention to the food pantry report that was distributed to cabinet members.
- Rev. Beth offered major congratulations to the thrift shop people who do a great job and raise money for the church. There are always folks coming in to buy!
- John Sharland mentioned security. Do we need to be more vigilant? There are people acting out against those who support the LGBTQ+ community, and we should be aware of that whenever we are gathering as a church community. The SNEUCC conference offers training workshops. Open and affirming churches are being targeted.
- The Sandwich UCC church is hosting a workshop "From Generation to Generation – Honoring Tradition while Embracing Change". Rev. Beth is attending and would welcome anyone that wants to attend with her. It's on 9/24.

Rev. Beth asked everyone to share their favorite moment of the summer.
