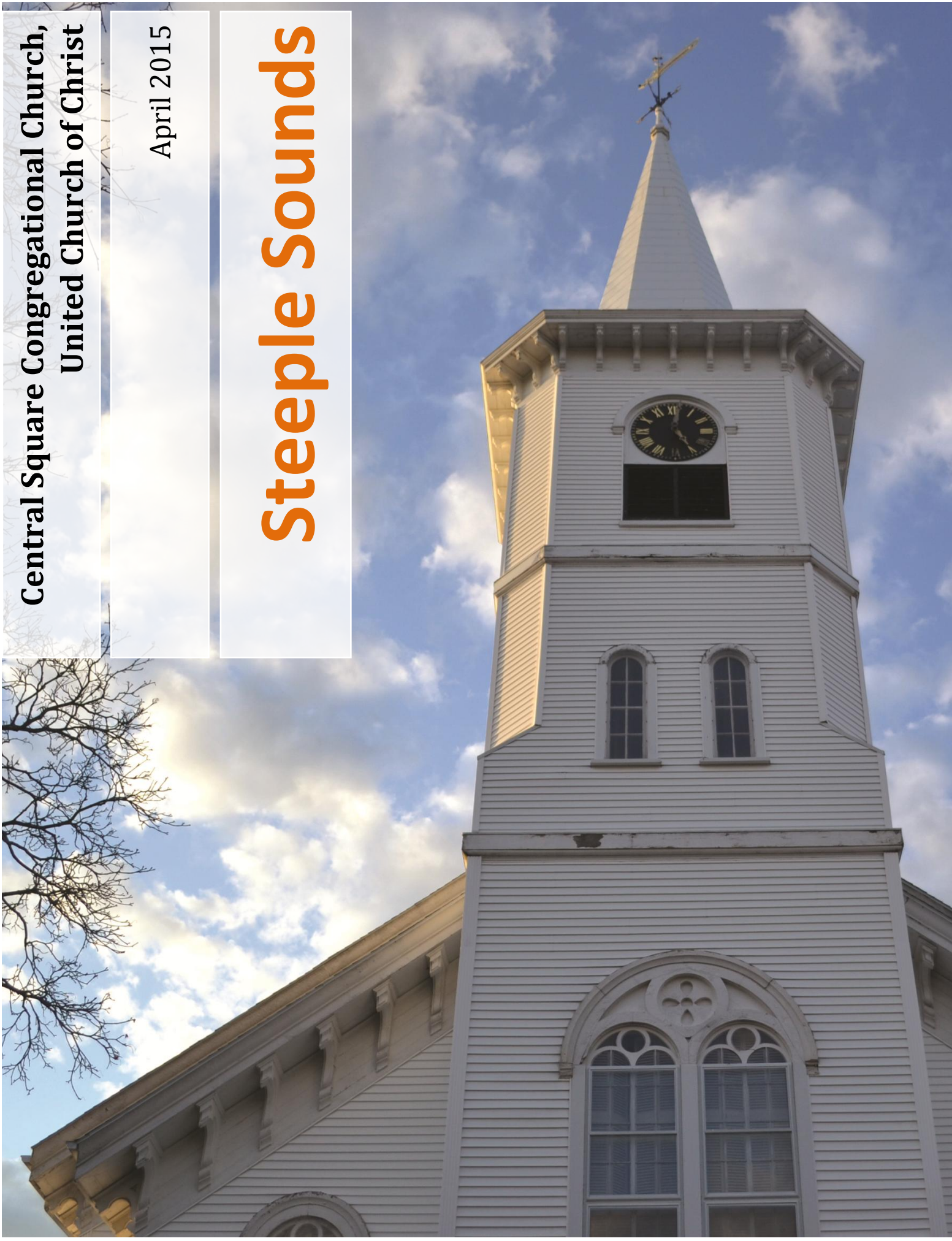

From the Holy Week Worship Team

“But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knit together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body’s growth in building itself up in love.”

-Ephesians 4:15-16

This year, we pulled together a team of faithful people to work together to plan Holy Week worship and activities. This team was brought together to form a sort of “think-tank” about how we can really listen to God as we gather during this sacred time of year. As we recall the events of Holy Week; Jesus’ triumphant entry into Jerusalem, the Last Supper with his disciples, his death and resurrection, we’re given an opportunity to re-tell and re-engage in the story in a deeply personal way. At the same time, this story, this series of events is also what brings us together as a community. We are bound together by the very body we remember during Holy Week.

As our Holy Week Worship Team met to plan, we re-told the stories and events of that week of Jesus’ life and we imagined what it must have been like for everyone involved. We asked questions like, “What is the word ‘betrayal’ in Greek? In Hebrew?” and “Who all was there for the Last Supper?” and “What must it have been like to hear and know that your friend was about to be killed?” and “How do we create space that reflects the worship we’re trying to build?” All of our questions and all of our discussion led to planning the events and worship space for Holy Week.

We hope you’ll join us for all of our Holy Week activities and worship opportunities as we build up the body of Christ. If you have any questions, please ask us!

The Mexican Tetra is a small fish that will eat anything that will fit into its mouth. It lives in small pools that have sandy or rocky bottoms. Another species, the Olm is a small lizard which is found in Europe. The Olm eats snails, insects, and small crabs. These two species are found at opposite ends of the Earth, but they share a common trait. They have undeveloped eyes, and both are totally blind.

If you were able to tell either the Mexican Tetra or the Olm about light and eyesight I believe they would tell you that these things do not exist. After all they have spent their whole life without seeing anything and they do just fine. What we see so clearly with our eyes does not exist in their worlds.

Similarly, the concept of faith and the Holy Spirit does not exist in some people's understanding. And yet we at CSCC have eyes and are believers. Through Jesus our eyes are opened. And through Jesus we are also charged with assisting in the enlightenment of others who may be struggling with their faith.

Does our church have a plan for newcomers that have come a few times?

Yes, it is a challenge to get people to come to church for the first time, and often when that is finally accomplished, we think our work is done and the newcomer will settle in and become a disciple. But without an intentional plan, many new people will not grow in faith and will drift away from church. Here are some steps to take the first-time guest all the way on the journey to being a faithful, committed follower of Christ. This is the job of the whole congregation. Share what you have learned with the pastor or any Growth member!

- Follow up on the first and second time visits of a guest with a layperson and then a staff person.
- Have an early conversation with newcomers about where they are on their life and faith journey to begin to know how to connect them appropriately.
- Begin to discover what the new person is interested in/has passion for.
- Train the new person to use his/her gifts.
- Find the appropriate small group, task force, mission team, etc. that will nurture this new person.
- Mentor new person in spiritual disciplines and model the faith.
- Teach this new disciple how to invite and disciple others.

Excerpts from *As We Worship, So We Believe* by Elizabeth Sandell

Worship in the New Testament

In the New Testament, the good news is available to everyone, male or female, Jew or Gentile, adult or child. The message was immediately personified by Jesus Christ's birth. In his ministry, Jesus himself directed his followers to bring children to know and praise him. Furthermore, in the New Testament the image of a child continues to be used as a powerful metaphor.

Perhaps most importantly, Jesus Christ was born on earth as an infant, personifying dependency and helplessness. At the birth of Jesus, Scripture records three beautiful songs, each one praising God for bringing Jesus Christ as an infant. Mary's song glorifies the Lord for his mercy toward the humble people (Luke 1:46-55). The angels' song praises God for the birth of a baby, now wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger (Luke 2:14). Simeon's song tells of his wonder and satisfaction upon seeing the child, in whom salvation will be accomplished (Luke 2:29-32).

Later, during his ministry, Jesus became indignant when the disciples tried to keep children away out of fear that they would disturb him. The disciples were blind to the worth of even the youngest ones. Jesus did not just scold adults for forbidding children to approach him; he rebuked them for hindering the children, for neglecting to bring them to himself (Luke 18:15-17).

In the New Testament, too, the image of a child is used as a metaphor for qualities necessary among Christians, particularly trust and receptivity. Jesus Christ said that anyone who will not receive the kingdom of God like a child will never enter it (Mark 10:13-16). Jesus welcomed spontaneous praise and worship and invited it from little children. As with the Old Testament images of children, how will we be able to understand these New Testament images if the children are not with us?

We Become the *Ekklesia*

The church is designed to be the welcoming community that makes us unique, separate from the world as the worshipping congregation. The Christian church acknowledges together that we are the *ekklesia*, the corporate body of Jesus Christ. The whole family of God is "called out of" the world to be separate from the world in order to worship God. We are to meet in Christian fellowship, to love each other, to learn, to worship, and to nurture others in faith. We model God's design for a community where differences are accepted and affirmed, where individuals feel they belong.

Children Complete the Family of Faith

When worship happens in the fellowship of faith, it becomes a celebration of belonging and participating in that community. We need children with us to complete the family of faith, to make it all that Jesus envisioned for the church. When we begin to include children, we also begin to be open to everyone, as Jesus commanded: the children, the poor, the powerless, the foreigners, the sinners. With a view of worship that includes children in significant ways, our words and actions communicate meaningfully with many different kinds of people, and we truly become a community.
