

# Women's Guild & Fellowship Come Join Us!



# From Christian Education



#### Heifer

What a wonderful way to spend the month of January, learning about Heifer Project International through the rotation model. The children will have an opportunity to explore Heifer through one of the following workshops: art, cooking drama, geography Make your own video, movement/games, photography, puppetry, science or storytelling. Pre-schoolers and kindergarten children will learn about Heifer in ways that plant the seed of solid awareness. Grades 1 – 5 will find the experience to be fun, interactive and enlightening as they learn about Christian service through Bible study, engaging activities and Heifer. Tweens and youth are working on forging their identity. That's a perfect time to explore the call to act on their faith. While experiencing a workshop curriculum the children will select an animal for sponsorship. This whole experience will culminate with the **Living Gift Market**, when the children will share what they have learned and fundraise for Heifer by inviting the congregation to experience a Heifer market. Come and see what it is all about on Sunday, January 29<sup>th</sup> following church in the fellowship hall.

## **Adult Heifer Participation**

If you are called to be a part of the Heifer experience there are many ways you may participate. 1. You could work directly with the children and teach a class in the rotation model. 2. Participants are needed at the Living Gift Market behind the scenes counting the money. 3. People are needed to monitor a table where people may sponsor an animal. 4. You may try your hand at having a table at the Living Gift Market and sponsor an animal raising funds towards purchasing that animal. 5. The final way is you could be a cow courier and move one of 3 cows to homes of your friends. That could be a fun experience for you and your children to experience together. ## **Updates from Cabinet**: December Meeting

Rev. Beth submitted her report. In addition, she noted that the Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services will be wonderful thanks to the work of the Advent Think Tank.

Treasurer Larry Brown submitted his report. We are at 46% of expected income and our expenses are at 50%, which are mostly on track. There will be some end of year donations as well.

Board of Deacons: The Advent Think Tank was commended for all their hard work. Deacons purchased two large wreaths for the church. Deacons also commend the Board of Christian Ed for the wonderful Christmas pageant. Deacons may be trying to reschedule meetings as attendance is down. Membership and confirmation Sunday are being worked on. Thanks to Brad Barnsley for suggesting having acolytes ring the church bells, as they love it. It has been a big hit with the kids and their families.

Board of Trustees: The estimate for the re-doing all the church lights came in at \$23,000. It is \$17,000 after National Grid portion. That's too high for us right now, so the project will start with the lights in the fellowship hall and then will go from there at some point. An estimate for just that portion is being worked on. A general contractor will be giving estimates on the work needed inside and outside the church so there will be a total for a possible new capital campaign. The church sound system needs to be addressed. After some discussion it was decided to form a subcommittee to review the congregations' needs first. After that, there can be some assessment as to what can be done to help meet those needs. This will begin after the holidays. **Opportunity**: if you are interested in helping to consult and formulate a plan for sound system solutions, please contact Diane Sheibley, diane@sheibley.net.

Board of Stewardship: Stewardship is in discussions about a possible new capital campaign. Time and talent opportunities for the bulletin were given.

Board of Christian Education: The advent workshop and the pageant went very well. January is Heifer month! The women's retreat theme will be the Beat Within Us. There will be a music subcommittee for the retreat, which will be held January 27-28. All women welcome! Bring your friends!

Board of Outreach: \$800 has been allocated to warmth in cold places, and collection of coats and other warm items is in full swing. Items will be distributed on January 16th and 17th for Taunton and Brockton homeless. Teen Challenge will be at our service on January 22nd. The Bridgewater Food Pantry gave out 56 Thanksgiving baskets, a little down from last year. The Boston Food Bank provided all of the turkeys. Larry Brown asked about the re-doing of the shelves in the hallway. They are a work in progress and more will be done after the holidays. Outreach will be reviewing charities they have given money to in the past and allocating some money to them. Larry also inquired if there were any groups in the area getting ready to help out the refugees. This will be looked into. Gordon reminded Outreach to work with Trustees when making plans for the new shelving.

Music Committee: Thanks were given to everyone who contributed to Lin's retirement celebration. Gift cards for local restaurants were given to her. The choir is looking forward to working with Julia during the next few months, as she will be acting as both accompanist and choir director. After the first of the year, work will be done to decide if the accompanist and director will remain combined or be kept as two positions. Gordon asked that an "atta girl" be given to Ellen for the Christmas Hymnal Supplements.

Growth Committee: Only 4 families came to see the Living Nativity. The committee brainstormed and decided to try the Living Nativity during Christmas on the Common next year. "Snack with a pack" is still being considered (a "dine with nine" concept that includes whole families). New church t-shirts are being discussed. The church needs greeters! It was suggested to utilize volunteers that are not on Growth to solicit interest at coffee hour. It was suggested that the church as a whole can do a better job at mingling with new people during coffee hour.

Coffee hour will be done by Mission Youth for the month of January, although Rev. Beth offered to take care of it on January 1.

Women's Guild and Fellowship: The annual Christmas service was wonderful. During the business portion of the meeting it was decided to buy a new crockpot instead of a coffee maker for the church. In January, items will be collected for the animal shelter in Brockton.
