"The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

Matthew 13:31b-32

In the parable of the mustard seed, Jesus speaks of a man who planted mustard in a nearby field. The plants took root, and grew so big and so tall that the birds of the air came to build nests in the branches. It's a great story, but there's just one problem. Mustard doesn't grow that way. Sacramental Surplus (An Excerpt from Daniel Hazard at http://www.ucc.org/across-the-ucc-world)

Pastor: Holy Communion calls us to universal solidarity

"There's a surplus of meaning in the sacrament, and we don't want to nail it down to one thing," says the Rev. Mary Luti, one of the pastors at First Church in Cambridge (Mass.) UCC.

Luti says her congregation celebrates communion once monthly at the morning worship, besides special feast days. A Sunday afternoon service featuring gospel and jazz music serves weekly communion.

Luti feels there is a renewed interest in ritual action across the UCC, not only in the sacrament of communion, but also healing and anointing.

"It's a positive development," she says. "It recovers some of the most ancient traditions of the church that are neither Catholic nor Protestant. They are simply practices that help our bodies and our minds."

To Luti, making sure the communion service never loses its edge is the key to making the ritual meaningful and thought-provoking.

"Very often we repeat the line, 'Jesus sat down to supper with the one who would betray him and the one who would deny him.' That line refers to Judas and Peter," she says.

"There is a challenge there. How do we sit with our enemies? How do we sit with the people we don't agree with, or who don't love us?"

"On World Communion Sunday, a lot of churches are rediscovering the universal aspect of our communion," says Luti. "These rituals are among the ways we show forth and also ground our solidarity with people all over the world."

For Luti, communion has a meaning that transcends time and place. "During communion," she says, "we really link up with the church as it has been, as it is now, and as it will be ... we look forward to the day when everyone will be fed around this table with equal joy and equal justice.

October 2, 2016 Neighbors in Need Special Mission Offering

The Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive on October 2, 2016, supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Through UCC.org/justice, our national Justice and Witness Ministries office offers resources, news updates, and action alerts on a broad spectrum of justice issues. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network(a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice. Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, ARicknara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

We ask that consider giving to this wider church ministry that is sponsored by the UCC, our greater denomination. The offering will be received during worship on October 2. This fall we are once again exploring the Old Testament in the Spark Curriculum. We have some openings in our teaching staff, and in order to present the curriculum in the way it is intended we need your help. We have two teaching openings in pre-k and Kindergarten, one in grades 1, 2, and 3 and one in the fourth and fifth grade class. You have an opportunity to set up the teaching schedule with your teaching partner. This allows you to attend church or meet your family's needs each week and have the opportunity to teach the children about God and God's way. You do not need to have previous teaching experience to become a Sunday school teacher. You will be trained in how to present the curriculum and I assure you it is very easy to follow. Our Teaching Staff

Presently we have a wonderful teaching staff dedicated to presenting the stories of the Bible to the children and youth. Krissy Cannizzo and Christine Compton are the first, second and third grade teachers. They are experienced Sunday school teachers having worked with the children for several years. They also work with children in different capacities outside of church. Kristen Struzik is the fourth, fifth grade teacher. Kristen has taught this age group for several years and teaches in the public school. Sharing the teaching of the sixth, seventh and eighth grade class are Meg McDermott and Christine Hoyt. Meg was a member of the Christian Ed committee for the past 6 years and has taught different age groups over the years. Christine Hoyt is a Kindergarten teacher in a public school and has been a girl scout leader of various age groups.

Spark Curriculum

This fall we are exploring the Old Testament in the Bible, but different stories from last year. The Curriculum is set up in an easy way to present to the children. The pictures in the children's Bible are engaging and colorful. The Bible for the children in grades three and up has words in the margins that explain various passages. Questions are also present to help the children think about what they are reading. Third and fourth grade students spend time learning how to explore the Bible. The lessons are divided into four parts. When the children arrive in class they participate in an activity that introduces the lesson. The activity may be to play a game, sing songs, make a craft, play with specific toys etc. The next step is to read the story in the Bible. Part three is to use the pamphlets included in the curriculum. This serves to help the children understand the lesson through various activities. The pamphlets also share interesting facts that relate to the past and the present. The final part of the lesson is a quick review and a prayer. As the year progresses we will keep you informed concerning the events of the year and the format of the lessons.
