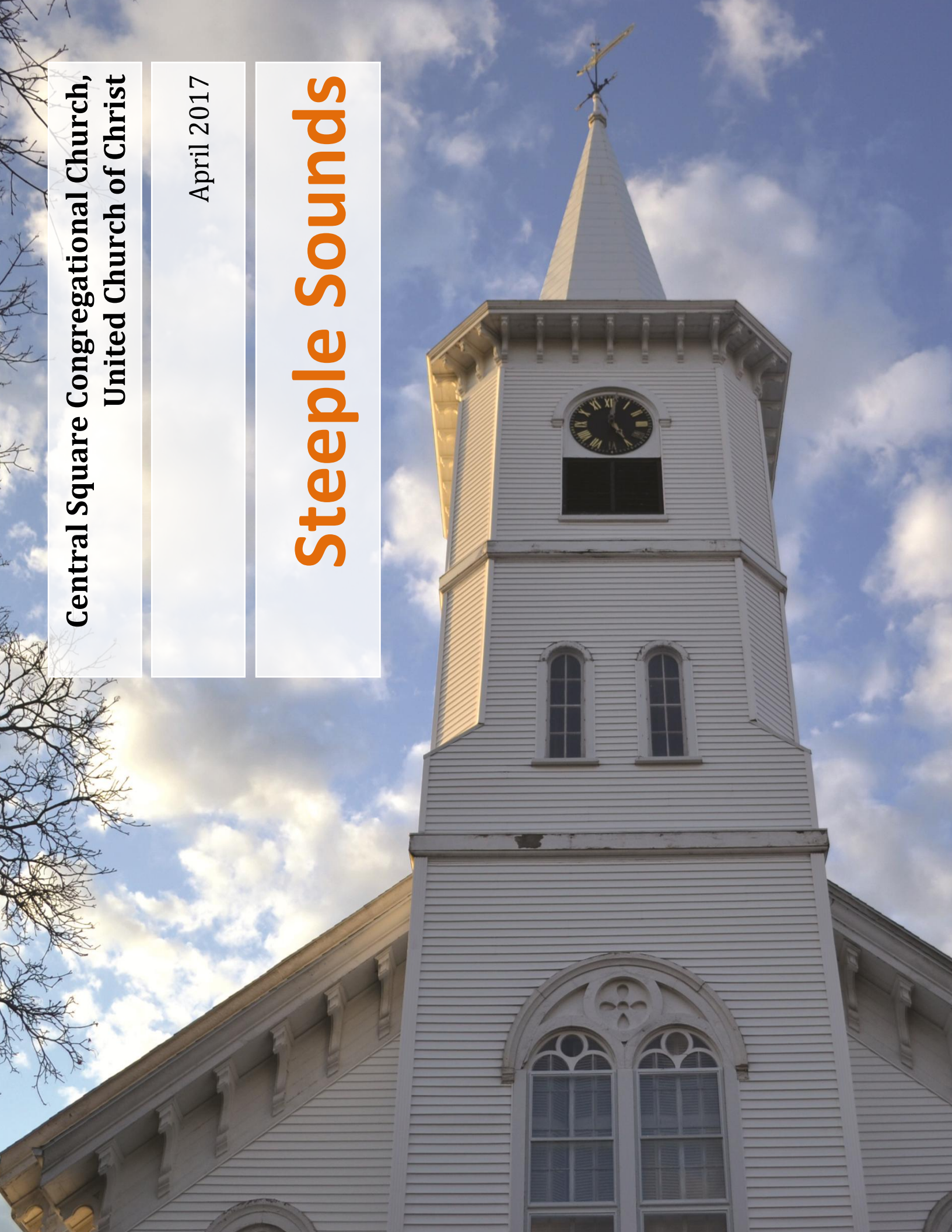

As I repeated the chorus, something came over me and I was filled with emotion.

Suddenly, I was standing with Mary Magdalene at the tomb of Jesus.

In the Gospel of John we are told that it was early in the morning on the first day of the week that she went to the place where her dear friend's body had been buried. It was still dark. She found that the giant stone barring the entrance had been moved and his body was no longer present. Mary assumed someone had stolen it and she ran to alert the other followers of Jesus.

From the Board of Trustees

FROM YOUR BOARD OF TRUSTEES – SAYING GOODBYE TO AN OLD FRIEND

We're saying goodbye to an old friend. A warm place where many prayers were said by many different people and many refreshments were served at small group meetings, everything from hot tea in formal tea cups to medium priced wine in plastic wine glasses.

In January of 1931, the members of Central Square Congregational Church purchased the house at 81 Union St. to serve as the parsonage for current and future pastors called to our church. I do not know where the parsonage was before that or if there was one. Maybe our current History and Memorials Committee could search our records and tell us.

Eighty six years later, on Sunday, March 12, 2017, the members of Central Square Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, voted to sell the parsonage and to establish a housing allowance for its current and future settled pastors. We joined the 74% of UCC churches that no longer own a parsonage and who pay a housing allowance. We believe by now almost all members know the reason that we made this change. But to reiterate, Pastor Beth and her husband have purchased their own home. We have established a housing allowance of \$1800/month.

With the expiring expenses of upkeep and maintenance on the parsonage, homeowners insurance on the parsonage, the annual Equity Payment we made to our pastors over the last many, many years, etc., and adding in the housing allowance annual total of \$21,600, we will have an estimated needed annual increase of somewhere between \$3000 and \$5000 dollars in the budget. While this is not the end of the world financially, we would hope that our members will close this gap with their pledged giving.

Two HUGE celebrations go with this change. First, we have 13 new members (can I get an AMEN!) who hopefully understand and are in a position to pledge their financial support to the church during our upcoming 2017 to help close that small gap and second, we will have a mortgage burning party on our front lawn sometime this spring. Can I get an amen and an AMEN!!

Palm Sunday

Updates from Cabinet

At the congregational meeting on March 12, Central Square Congregational Church voted unanimously to sell the church parsonage. The move was prompted by Rev. Beth Stott's decision to move out of the home in favor of purchasing a new home with her family.

It will be listed with the assistance of Beth Basler, realtor with Keller Williams Realty. Cabinet approved Diane Sheibley (Moderator) and Gordon Brailsford (Chair of Trustees) as the authorized signers on behalf of the church on the transaction.

The Board of Deacons would like Cabinet to keep in mind that an associate pastor will be needed at some point and the church needs to be thinking about ways to hire one. This may not be feasible now but should be in our minds for the future. Also, on Sunday July 9th, the high school graduates will be celebrated.

The Trustees noted that the sound system funds received from the Women's Guild in the amount of \$4000 has gone into the Memorials account. The Trustees will be working with getting consulting input as well as input from Paul Holmes on the best system for our facility.

In other Trustees' work: the Sunday school door was fixed; the file cabinet purchase was approved and will be purchased soon; an electrician will be coming in to add two outlets in the Fellowship Hall; the endowment funds will be reviewed this Sunday at 9 am; and July 28th is the date for the golf tournament. It was also noted that there is a church pew, plus some other items like a snowblower and lawnmower at the parsonage that will have to be removed by the time of the sale, so let's figure out where they should go.

The Board of Stewardship noted that Stewardship Sunday is April 30. They also noted that talk of a new capital campaign has been back burnered for now.

The Board of Christian Education noted that the Mission supper was a huge success. The food was outstanding and everyone had a lovely time. In addition, the Sunday school students are learning Holy stories from the book of Luke, and the Heifer farm field trip sign up is ongoing. The men's retreat isn't getting as much response, and CE is considering teaming up with another church for a joint retreat.

Regarding the Board of Outreach, a delivery of clothing was taken to Penelope's Place, and a donation was made to Mitchell's Monsters. Other work is ongoing.

From the Music Committee: the choir retreat on February 15th was a huge success. The choir learned some new songs and techniques. The Junior choir is doing well, and Julia is also working with the Sunday school kids on hymns that are often sung in church.

On the Growth Committee, Christine Hoyt is almost done getting the banner for the Little League field. Dine with 9 sign ups have been completed! Groups lists will be distributed soon. Progress is also being made with signing up greeters.

The Women's Guild and Fellowship recent brought donations they had collected to the Animal Protection Center. They were thrilled with the amount of items they received. The cleanup bucket was filled with the generosity of the church goers! They also requested permission for a 50/50 raffle at the April 1st Rummage Sale, which was granted by unanimous vote of the Cabinet. Their next meeting topic will be Journey to Jerusalem. Also, the Women's Guild donated \$500 to the mission youth.

Finally, it was noted for the record that EVERY Board and Committee was represented at the March Cabinet meeting. Great going, everyone! Thank you!
