This past Sunday in worship, our Superintendent of the Sunday School, Krissy Cannizzo, had the whole congregation stand in a circle holding hands. Then, she handed me an energy stick and it lit up and made this squealing sound as we held hands. The moment someone let go or separated themselves from the circle, the energy stick went dead. She did this to illustrate the connection and power, the spirit of God that flows through us when we are together.

I have to admit, I got a little choked up as we did this exercise. I often feel the love and connectedness of our congregation, and I see it frequently in how we care for each other. But this exercise brought that feeling to life. Each person in the circle could see how important they are. Each person present could understand, on a visceral level, their part in our community. Each person recognized their role in making the energy/spirit come to life.

This is key to understand in any community, but especially in a community of faith. Religion, faith, and spirituality are very abstract concepts. So we need things that bring those concepts to reality, down to our earthly level. This is why we serve each other. This is why we care for each other by making meals, volunteering in the Sunday School or Food Pantry. This is why we study scripture together. To bring to life the abstract and illustrate how truly connected we all are and our responsibility to the interconnected web of all existence.

As the seasons change, may you feel a sense of connectedness to all of creation. And may you find yourself changing too.

Thought on World Communion Sunday (by Rev. Doctor Terry Moore)

Sunday, October 1, is World Communion Sunday. It is a great Sunday where Christians around the world come together to celebrate the sacrament of Holy Communion. It is like the entire Christian family coming to the family table to share a meal together. God's table.

Each week we join together for worship and we affirm our faith with The Apostle's Creed. We testify that we believe in, "the holy catholic church." We are a part of the larger universal Christian church, the holy catholic church. We are brothers and sisters with our Christian family around the world.

We are in ministry together with the larger church. We are one with churches throughout our community, our country, and our world. We give thanks to God for sister churches in Kenya, Bulgaria, Romania, Costa Rica, and many others.

Holy Communion – sacred oneness. Jesus prayed that the church would be one.

"I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, ²¹ that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. ²² The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, ²³ I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me." John 17:20-23 (NRSV)

We are one so that the world may know Jesus Christ.

The Apostle's Creed concludes with affirming the "communion of saints." Saints are those who believe in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, members of the body of Christ, the church. Holy Communion is a sacred oneness with God and with our brothers and sisters in Christ.

We are the church. We are members of the larger church. We are in ministry together. We come to God's table together on World Communion Sunday. It is a glimpse of the people of God feasting together at God's heavenly banquet.

Congregational Polity: What's the Secret?

When attempting to understand Congregational Polity, which is a system of church self-governance, it's important to look back at the origin of congregationalism. Our church roots go back to the mid 1600's in New England. We are descended from Puritan movement of that period. The defining difference between Congregationalist and the other Protestant denominations formed at that time was "church self governance"

While it may appear to be democracy in its simplest form, God has given the government of the church to an ordained ministry and the congregational Polity provides for a system of checks and balances of power over the clergy, lay officers and lay members.

Each member has the opportunity, and the responsibility, to participate in the life and governance of their church through their "time, treasure or talent." We refer to this responsibility as Stewardship. Without the active participation of "Stewardship" Gods work and His message through the life of the church becomes jeopardized.

As in the past, your Stewardship team will launch our 2018 Stewardship Campaign during the early months s of 2018. However, this year we will attempt to engage with the members of the congregation immediately to discuss Stewardship. We thought we would start at the beginning. A little history lesson of the origins of our denomination and specifically CSCC and our relationship with the United Church of Christ. We thought this would helpful to the newer members of our church and clarify any questions our more tenured members may have.

You will hearing more from your Stewardship team shortly.


