Christmas: the story of God entering into this world as a vulnerable infant. We re-tell this story every year. We have many traditions that embody it and pass those traditions down from generation to generation. As we enter into the month of December, we enter into the season of Advent, the season of intentional preparation and waiting for the "grand" entry of our God.

This season is a mix of emotions for many. Including me. I love Advent and the practice of preparation and the practice of waiting that we are invited into. There is a bit of anxiety as a pastor, wanting the season to be relevant to every single person, and services "perfect" and filled with the Christmas Spirit. For some of us, Advent is filled with a plethora of emotions. Maybe it is filled with some emptiness, as we

recognize the absence of many loved ones who have died and have left voids in family gatherings and traditions. Or maybe it's a melancholy time as we retell the stories of Christmases past, feeling as if something isn't quite the same.

In the church, we retell the story of God entering the world because we must not forget it. We retell this story to remind ourselves that God is present, always. God was in that manger and continues to be present all around us in this world. We retell this story to remind ourselves that God is present in every emotion we might experience this season. We retell this story, in the hope that we will be open to the ways that God is entering into the world around us in unexpected ways.

Because this season brings a lot of different emotions and because of the times when it can be filled with busy-ness, gatherings, and running around, we need to be intentional if we want to experience all that God has in store for us and the church this season. This year, let's commit to open ourselves up to the presence of God around us and open ourselves to the unexpected ways God is entering into the world around us as well.

If you have a hard time being present to God around you, here's a little homework:

Find a notebook or make a folder on your phone or on your computer. Label it "God Sightings." Each morning throughout the season of Advent, pray that you may see God entering into this world in unexpected ways. Pray that you may notice ways that God has always been present but may have missed. As you go throughout your day, make notes, or take pictures on your phone of ways that God has revealed God's self to you. And then reflect on the ways that God is encouraging you to respond to these "God Sightings." It is incredible the things we miss. It is incredible how much of God we miss. And it is amazing the ways lives are changed when we recognize God and respond.

In all that you experience this Advent and Christmas season, I pray that the presence of God is felt and experienced around and within you. May God's blessing on you, overflow to the world around you.




Upcoming Advent Opportunities

From Christian Outreach

The holiday season is always a hectic time for Christian Outreach and the Food Pantry. On Saturday, November 17th the Food Pantry and volunteers sorted tons of food donations in preparation for Thanksgiving. Then, Monday the 19th, they put the bags together for those in need. On Tuesday they add the turkeys to the bags of food and families pick them up. This is all done in the Fellowship Hall of CSCC. In total, they will have put together and given out between 85-90 Thanksgiving meals for families in need. This is the fifth or sixth year that they've done this, and each year they are able to assist more families.

December is also busy. It is the **Warmth in Cold Places** offering collection. Christian Outreach is collecting clothing to take over to a church in Taunton to be given out at their soup kitchen. Outreach is asking for donations of warm clothing – hats, sweatshirts, hoodies and warm socks. Also gloves, mittens, and long underwear are needed. Shoes and boots as well as given out. Members of Christian Outreach will also be purchasing socks and sweatshirts from Christian Outreach funds. Any extra clothing goes to the Brockton homeless.

Two other projects that Christian Outreach is involved with are:

The Christmas Fund – This is a fund setup to help retired clergy and other people involved with the UCC that are having a difficult time.

Operation Santa – Christian Outreach contributes to this fund each year. This fund is run by the Bridgewater Fire department.

From the Board of Trustees

In a recent edition of the Massachusetts Conference *Spotlight*, Charlie Kuchenrod spoke some of my favorite thoughts about stewardship. (Why would a Trustee like me be interested in stewardship? You can't spend what you don't have.)

Charlie is the Executive Associate Conference Minister for the Connecticut Conference, UCC Here are some of the things he loves to say when he is invited to "preach" at churches and other events on the subject of Stewardship:

- -The job of the stewardship committee is not to get people to give more money; it is to get people to be more faithful givers.
- -The stewardship committee often is placed in the church trustee/finance & budget constellation of people. It belongs in the deacon/faith formation constellation of people.
- -What would Jesus drive? Jesus wouldn't drive; he would take the bus.

And he gets to quote some great stuff and preach on it:

"Fundraising is always a call to conversion." – Henri Nouwen

"It is pastoral malpractice not to know what parishioners give to the church." - J. Clif Christopher

"Everyone who saw this grumbled..." Luke 19:7 (Common Era Bible)

"Religious fundraising is more about ministry than it is about money." William Enright

He gets excited talking about the transformational impact of giving on the giver. He gets amped up talking (preaching!) about a right relationship with money – not just for individuals, but for congregations. "Stop talking about paying the bills and balancing the budget, for God's sake!" He sees how deep engagement with stewardship can be a source of energy within a congregation.

Personal witness about growing in stewardship is powerful. I am willing to share our family's story, which started about 20 years ago. Just ask.

CSCC Cabinet Meeting -- Minutes

November 14, 2018 *** DRAFT ***

Meeting called to order at 7:05

Cabinet members in attendance: Reverend Beth Stotts, Pastor; Diane Sheibley, Moderator; Mark Sorgman, Vice Moderator; Dave Sheibley, Treasurer; Anne Malmquist, Board of Deacons; John Sharland, Board of Trustees; Brad Barnsley, Board of Stewardship; Bill O'Neil, Board of Christian Outreach; Rob Basler, Board of Christian Outreach; Lisa Masiello, Board of Christian Education; Gail Wershing, Growth Committee; Barbara Morey, History & Memorials Committee; Terry Reynolds, Women's Guild and Fellowship

Rev. Beth led the group in a devotional.

Minutes from the October meeting were reviewed. Rev. Beth motioned that they be accepted. Gail Wershing seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Board of Christian Education Report – Lisa Masiello

The blessing and decorating of the pumpkins went well last month. Sunday School starts this Sunday (11/18) – the children and youth will be working on assembling blessing bags for the homeless in Brockton with the help of Women's Guild members, and Rob Basler and Judy Pino will talk to them about this mission. This Saturday (11/17) is the leaf raking event by the youth to raise money for the June mission trip. The Advent Workshop is Saturday 12/1 at 5:30pm. Exploration of a youth minister is still being worked on. The church in Weymouth is trying to work out a date that we (and other churches) can visit to observe their very successful youth group program, and there is a survey that youth and their parents are asked to complete. Sunday School is still looking for teacher volunteers.

Pastor's Report - Rev. Beth Stotts

Rev. Beth provided a printed copy of her report. She called attention to the upcoming events: 11/20, Ecumenical Thanksgiving worship; 12/1, Advent workshop; 12/15, Advent book study. There will be two services on Christmas eve, 5pm and 10pm. Please note that the office will be closed Christmas week through new year's, 12/25-1/1.

Treasurer's Report - David Sheibley

A printed copy of the Treasurer's Report was handed out, and Dave reviewed it. At 37% through the fiscal year, revenue is at 39% and expenses are at 35%. A discussion followed about the conference annual dues. We should make an effort to make members aware that the church must pay this amount on their behalf, and it would be good if members could make their individual dues contributions. Dues this year are \$20.33 per person (not per pledging unit, but per individual member). Perhaps a notice could be put in with the quarterly statements next time they go out, reminding them of the dues amount. A notification would have to go out in addition to nonpledging members.

Board of Deacons' Report - Anne Malmquist

Anne reported that the Deacons are going to a new meeting format: they will have one quarterly evening meeting, and a short meeting every Sunday after service to touch base on current projects. John asked if we are still doing the Deacons Fund. Anne said yes, but it hasn't been promoted in a while. It was discussed that perhaps we should have financial presentations on periodic Sundays, reviewing all the different ways our church collects money, and what they are used for. Possibly talk about it on Thanksgiving Sunday? Perhaps review it in Steeple Sounds?

Board of Trustees' Report - John Sharland

The dishwasher seemed to work just fine for the fair and the turkey supper, so no need to take any action on it at the moment. The hutch that's in the fellowship hall needs to come upstairs; John will recruit help to make that happen. There is a new table in the sanctuary donated by the Women's Guild that will be dedicated this Sunday. It will be the new table used for people to write cards. It was recently discovered through the new water meter that there is a gallon per minute leak in the building, and it was traced to one of the toilets on the first floor. John has let Rich Sullivan know, and has marked the bathroom as out of order.

Rev. Beth noted that there has been a request by the youth – they would like a tour of the bells and how the music happens. Check with Gordon as to access and information – could be a dangerous climb to reach them.

Board of Stewardship Report - Brad Barnsley

Brad reported that Stewardship this year is still a work in progress. It would be ideal if they had more people.

Bill O'Neil mentioned that if you are 70.5 and have an IRA, there is a required distribution that you must take. If you donate that distribution to a charity, it's not taxed. People could use this distribution to help meet their annual pledge. Diane asked Bill if he would write that up and provide the resource he has for more information, for the next Steeple Sounds. Anne noted that this could be another topic discussed as part of the 'financial presentation' previously discussed.

Board of Christian Outreach Report - Bill O'Neil

Bill reported that he and Jack Melcher picked up 1400 pounds for the food pantry today. The Whitman food pantry also brought in a donation today, and Aldi's donated fish and chicken. This Saturday at 9am, food will be sorted following the local schools' food drives. Then on Monday night, the Thanksgiving packages will be assembled for Tuesday distribution. Thank you to Hanson Farm for storing the donated turkeys in their freezers.

Rob noted that between donations collected for hurricane relief, and Christian Outreach's contribution, \$1,317 was sent to help in the affected areas down south. This Sunday, the blessing bags will be assembled and blessed. Rob reported that he met with the "Soupman" in Bridgewater, and he has requested to cook his soups in our kitchen on most Saturday mornings. (He distributes soup and backpacks of essentials to the homeless in Brockton.) He promised to 'not leave any evidence behind him' in the kitchen. It was decided that he could have a key, and Rob would work with Ellen to make that happen and have him sign the proper associated documents. The key deposit would be waived. Rob will also work with Ellen regarding scheduling his days and times in the kitchen so she can put it on the calendar. The Board of Christian Outreach would be the liaison between the Soupman and the church.

One other item that Rob noted... the breakfast team does not want to do breakfast on Easter Sunday. It starts too early and lasts too long, and people are away from their families to do it.

Christian Outreach is also working on their Warmth in Cold Places drive, and will be heading up the Heifer project this year in association with CE. Brad suggested for Warmth in Cold Places to contact places like LL Bean, Ocean State Job Lot, and other places for donations from overstock, returns, or other surpluses. It

was also noted that we should make the community at large aware of this drive to make it more than just our church members donating. Bill will get PR info to Ellen to write it up, and she can send it to Gail Wershing on Growth and they will get it to the press.

History and Memorials Committee Report – Barbara Morey

A while back H&M distributed an extensive list of documents they found all around the church building. They have not had much feedback, so everyone is asked to please let them know if there are things on the list that should be kept. They especially want to hear from the Treasurers. There is a recommendation list that is available through the conference that Diane sent to Barbara. She will resend it to use as a guide.

Brian Pfeiffer, the historical building consultant, has been in the building doing his assessment. His preliminary report shows that while there are many items that can and should be fixed up, the structure is quite sound. He will write up all of this recommendations for items to address. He has also already told us it is OK to keep the aluminum siding up since the original wood is underneath it. Barbara will be organizing the grant committee in January after Brian's report comes in.

Growth Committee Report - Gail Wershing

A few breakfast coupons that were handed out at Autumnfest have been used, showing that folks have come to check us out. There will be no living nativity this year due to lack of volunteers to assume the roles and costumes. Growth will be giving out hot chocolate at Christmas on the Common, at a table in our Narthex. The committee is working on developing the mass mailing postcards previously discussed, which will feature Easter as well as mention a few other events we do.

Although some members of the boards and committees have stepped up to sign up as coffee hour host, many have not, and there are many holes in the schedule. If a host doesn't sign up, it could be that there is no coffee service on some Sundays.

Women's Guild & Fellowship Report – Terry Reynolds

Women's Guild is a sponsor of, and is helping with, the blessing bags that will be prepared by the children and youth this Sunday. The rummage sale netted \$2658. A desk and chair in memory of Selma Fisher will be dedicated this Sunday. The October WG&F meeting had a presentation on "Dress around the world". Using the same pattern, many dresses are made and distributed to those that need them. There are local workshops as well where volunteers gather to make dresses. The WG&F Christmas service will be on Wednesday, Dec. 5. Rob Basler thanked the WG&F for their monetary donations to mainspring meals, as well as for organizing and collecting the items for the blessing bags.

Other Business-

- * Remember that Christmas on the Common is on Sunday, Dec. 2, so coffee hour will be in the fireplace room.
- * Steeple Sounds submissions for the December issue is Monday, Nov. 19, at 10am.
- * Please remember to include contact information with your Steeple Sounds articles.
- * John Sharland, delegate to the conference, reported that there would be an Ecclesiastic council on 11/15 where candidates will be approved for ordination upon call. He also reminded people that Erin Reardon's ordination is 11/25 in Brockton.
