From The Desk of Rev. Beth



"Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD my whole life long." -Psalm 23:6

The Advent and Christmas season were very different for me this year. Typically, my advent is spent in the depths of research to create liturgical fanfare worthy of the season. Usually I spend my time meeting with folks to prepare services of meaning, song, and story. This year however, I spent much of Advent with my dying father.

Historically, Advent is a season of waiting. It's a season

where we focus on preparing our minds and hearts and spirits for the birth of Christ in our lives, year after year. In this way, we experience a sense of "expectant waiting". Something is there, but not quite. It's coming, but not yet. That isn't a very comfortable place to be.

Sitting at my father's bedside as he lay in hospice care, wasn't a very comfortable place to be either. Watching someone near the end of their earthly life and await a birth into their heavenly life gave me a whole new understanding of "expectant waiting". But in viewing death in this way, I found a tremendous peace. It didn't make the waiting easier, but it reminded me of the blessed assurance we receive from God through grace. The Advent themes of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love come to us when we rest in the chaos, knowing that God is with us, guiding us, present with us.

As we enter into a new year, as we welcome the birth of Christ, the birth of new ways of being and existing in the world, I'm reminded that our whole lives are filled with mini-deaths and mini-births. We are constantly in a period of "expectant waiting". We kind of always live in the midst of Advent, even as we begin a new year. So may we, in the midst of life and death, old and new, loss and abundance, be reminded of the abounding grace and presence we receive from God.

JANUARY OPPORTUNITIES FOR FAITH DEVELOPMENT

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<u>God and Me:</u> January 6 & 13 (1:00 PM – 2:30 PM)

The God and Me Program is designed to help elementary aged children become best friends with Jesus and tell their story of "God and Me" together.

Curriculum Goals:

- To provide an opportunity for young people and families to explore their faith together
- To help children realize that God is active in every part of their lives
- To help children know that Jesus is their best friend
- To memorize the Lord's Prayer

Children will tell their story of "God and Me" by starting with the creation story. Children will learn that God is their Creator and that God calls them by name, and they will give praise to God. Their story will continue as they learn of God's love through Jesus. As they tell parallel stories of their own birth and the birth of Jesus.



<u>God and Church:</u> January 6, 13, & 20 (3:00 PM – 4:30 PM)

The God and Church curriculum is designed to lead middle school aged youth on a three-part faith journey.

Curriculum Goals:

- To strengthen young people's relationship with Christ
- To challenge young people to learn about and participate in the worship and ministry of the church
- To have young people make a plan for daily Bible reading and memorize a creed or statement of belief or passage of scripture
- To provide the opportunity for young people to experience the joy of serving others

The three parts of the journey are: meeting Jesus, worshiping God, and witnessing and ministering for Christ. Participants will create either a video or a photo album to share what they have learned on their faith journeys. Young people will have the opportunity to work with their pastor or other Christian adults as they study the church's structures and objectives and participate in service projects that will give them a better understanding of the mission of the church.

The Holy Spirit

The worship service on December 16th, Music Sunday, Joy Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent, was a truly spectacular and moving experience. You should watch it on YouTube <u>here</u> if you didn't get to see it, or even if you want to see it again.

The scripture reading from the lectionary was Luke 3: 7-18. This passage did not feel appropriate for what we were doing in the sanctuary that morning, but it is very appropriate for what is going on in the world.

Luke 3:7-18 New International Version (NSRV):

"John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people."

Jesus tells us we should be generous and give with loving open hearts. John just asks us not to be greedy. A very appropriate message for the season.

From the Board of Trustees

In anticipation of our churches 200th anniversary from its founding in 1821, the Trustees and another small committee of members of our church family have been planning a Community Preservation grant request for funds to update the church building to appear as authentic as it was in 1865, when the building as we see it today was rebuilt after the fire of 1862. One of our fears revolved around the aluminum siding that now clads the outside of the building. While it protects the more vulnerable wooden clapboard beneath, it is hardly authentic and removing it would be expensive.

Well, the good news is that fear has been allayed. Brian Pfeiffer, a historical building consultant, has visited the church twice in recent weeks and had given us an encouraging assessment. Yes, there are things that can and should be done to the structure, removing the aluminum siding is not one of them since the original wood lies beneath.

Thank you so much for modifying the thresholds from the front of the Sanctuary to the corridors for easier travel for the wheelchair bound.

I watched today from my pew as a wheelchair bound person traversed the threshold like it wasn't even there, having watched the same person before, struggle and need assistance to be pushed over the threshold.

I would be lying if it didn't bring a tear to my eye. My father was handicapped, with very weak legs, due to polio. He loved fast food and take-out food just as much as anyone else, but he often suffered the indignity of not being able to go in. My mother did not drive, so that option was out. At his favorite Friday fish and chips place on Fremont St. in Taunton, he for years would call ahead, go over and sit outside and ask someone to get his order for him. Never in 20 years or more of doing that did anyone ever refuse him, steal his money or eat his fish.

My Dad would be 100 years old this coming February 4th. But God took him early, probably due to the polio, a kidney removed at mid-life, arterial by-pass surgery and a few other maladies. He died on Feb. 25, 2013 at age 94.

News from Growth

As I begin this article I reflect upon my reasons for coming to this Church over 28 years ago. At that time I had 3 children, ages 17, 5, and 6 mos. I was a disillusioned Catholic who felt abandoned by my church due to my previous divorce and remarriage. I had not even thought about coming to a "Protestant" church, which was taboo while growing up in a strong Italian Catholic family. But God was always a part of my life, even as organized religion was no longer a part of the equation.

That is, Until my 5 year old daughter, Allison, asked me **"Mommy, can I go to Sunday School like my friends?"** And then I began to ponder the values I had attained through my weekly attendance at Mass and Catechism. And the good far outweighed the bad (including going to Confession). So Ali and I started our **"Church Shopping",** with **Central Square being our 3rd** stop. We also visited a 4th church but found ourselves drawn back to this particular church.

Why? What drew us back? Was it the Super Welcomers who greeted us like we were already family? The welcoming, accepting Coffee Hour, where the children were allowed to play "Ring Around the Rosey" around the supporting poles? Was it Pastor Paul who came into the Sanctuary wearing a fishing hat and carrying a Fishing Rod, "Fishing for Men"? Was it being told that God was a "Loving God" not a God to be Feared? Or was it that My Whole Family was Welcome, even my husband, Al, who wasn't sure where he stood on "Jesus being the Messiah", but was invited to help out in the nursery, where my baby, Justin, was during the worship service, and where he became known as the "Nursery Man"?

For me, it was **All Those Things and More** (too many to mention). But in a Nutshell, Central Square Congregational Church was, and still is, a Relational Church. Our Mission Statement says it all, **"We are a Christian Community of People, Reaching out to our Neighbors, at Home and Abroad, Sharing Our Faith and Our Resources."**. And so as it became obvious to my daughter and to me that this church **"Beat Out the Competition"** in ways that were very important to us, so ended the Church Shopping of the disillusioned **"former"** Catholic mother and her family.

And over the years I have found that **As my Family's Needs have Changed so have the Opportunities** available to each of us, **Ways to Stay Involved and to Grow Spiritually and Emotionally.** I started my journey by teaching Sunday School, moving up the grades with my daughter, determined to learn the tenants of this denomination and ways it differed from Catholicism. My next stop was Christian Education (fit into my "teaching degree"). I then joined Christian Outreach as my career moved into the Social Work field, followed by Deacons, as my longing for deeper spiritual growth and ministry surfaced. And now I am on the Growth Committee, choosing to help our Community at Large find the Joy, the Hope and the Peace that have sustained my family and myself over the years.

And while I was on my own **Spiritual Journey**, so was my husband (who eventually joined the church and moved to the kitchen, cooking being his passion). And my children valued the **Mentors** who not only **Cared about**, **and Valued**, them but also Showed them ways that they could Care About the World around them. Their journeys as **Mission Youth** brought them to other areas of the country where they joined other like-minded Teens, to help other people who were Down on their Luck and needed a Helping Hand! And when we went through our really tough times (like most people do), my heart was filled with Gratitude for all of the Angels that reached out to us with hugs, love, words of encouragement, and needed resources. I have valued this Community, Our Church Family, more than words can express.

So WHY ARE YOU HERE? In this particular Church, at this particular time in your life? Is This Church a Gift from God to You? Or to Your Family? Why Not Share Your Story? with the people in your life who might benefit what we have to offer, or what they have to offer to us and the community at large? It doesn't matter if you're at the **Beginning of your Journey** or you're a **"Lifer"**? You know why you're here. Who do you know that needs love and support and hope at a time when we are being bombarded with news of violence, racial tensions and political divisions that threatens life as we know it, or hoped it would be?

Meeting called to order at 7:10

Rev. Beth led the group in a devotional.

Minutes from the November meeting were reviewed. Gail Wershing motioned that they be accepted. Dave Sheibley seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Pastor's Report - Rev. Beth Stotts

Rev. Beth thanked everyone for their thoughts and generosity in allowing her to be with her father during his last days and with her family for his services. The ecumenical Thanksgiving service was incredible. There was such a feeling of community, spirit, and energy there. She participated in a CPR certification renewal and the BSA of America Youth Protection Training class. The Women's Guild Christmas service sermon was written but Rev. Beth was unable to be attended due to spending time with her Dad in hospice. Terry Reynolds said that the sermon was well received and people thought the service was one of their best ever. She also attended the ordination of Pastor Erin Reardon. The pageant is this Sunday. There will be two services on Christmas eve (5 pm and 10 pm), and the services will be different from each other. Tea lights and candles will be offered so all can participate. The office is closed Christmas week. December 30th will be a hymn sing Sunday. January 6th is Epiphany.

Treasurer's Report - David Sheibley

We still have money and are doing okay. A few people gave extra at the end of the year which is helping. The church fair earned almost \$1000 more than was expected.

Board of Trustees' Report

John Sharland was unable to attend due to illness. Mark Sorgman explained that the fire alarm went off last Sunday. It is recommended that the breakfast crew put a fan in an open kitchen window every breakfast Sunday for the time being. There is a password to turn off the alarm so the Fire Department doesn't come, and it should be decided who will be given the password. There is a key to turn off the alarm, and it will be available to authorized people as well. We will be looking into a built-in wall fan near the refrigerator area for the future, as a less expensive solution for ventilation than a full stove exhaust system.

Board of Christian Ed Report- Lisa Masiello

December's meeting was not held and needs to be rescheduled due to illness and scheduling conflicts. January's focus will be on Heifer international. The Living Gift Market will be on January 27th. Family-friendly events are being planned for the next few months. The youth leaf raking fundraiser was cancelled due to weather. It usually raises \$1000 for the mission trip. A cookie sale was held last weekend to help make up for this loss of monies. It raised \$500. Other ideas are being planned including possibly a babysitting night, another cookie sale perhaps and maybe a spring session of leaf raking/yard cleanup. Christian Ed is still trying to co-ordinate with the highly attended youth group in Weymouth to get tips and guidance on a CSCC youth program. The plans for the new youth minister are still taking shape. Franco Ciaramitaro has volunteered to help with spreadsheets and other duties like that he can do from home for any boards and committees that need that.
