"Strike the rock, and water will come out of it, so that the people may drink." - Exodus 17:6

We hear a lot about the Israelites whining, complaining and arguing during the Exodus story. What we tend to forget is that what the Israelites were upset about were pretty basic concerns... They would cry, "We need food! We need water! We need a home!" Who wouldn't be upset about those things? When they complain that they are bored with manna and long for the better foods in Egypt, yes, those things are problematic. But being afraid of death in the midst of a desert because you have no water? That's a valid concern! They complain to Moses, who then complains to God. And God tells Moses where to stand and what staff to use, and Moses strikes the rock. And water pours forth from it.

We often look to this story as an example about how God provides for the people's needs, and that's part of it, for sure. What I'm more struck by, is the fact that the water was there all the time, the people just didn't know where to look for it, or how to look for it. God was already providing for them in abundance! It was hidden in plain sight, if they'd only bothered to look for it.

I think this can be true for us as well. How much time do we spend complaining and arguing and whining when we could be looking for the blessings in our midst? This church year, let's focus on looking for those hidden treasures here at CSCC. There are some amazing ministries happening in the congregation that we miss seeing. Really take the time to look around. You may realize that God's hidden abundance is flowing all around.

Don't forget to bring your spare change for the Coins for Kids Church collection on the first Sunday of the month! This helps to pay for



"Mercy is radical kindness," Anne Lamott writes in her enthralling and heartening book, *Hallelujah Anyway*. It's the permission you give others—and yourself—to forgive a debt, to absolve the unabsolvable, to let go of the judgment and pain that make life so difficult.

In Hallelujah Anyway: Rediscovering Mercy Lamott ventures to explore where to find meaning in life. We should begin, she suggests, by "facing a great big mess, especially the great big mess of ourselves." It's up to each of us to recognize the presence and importance of mercy everywhere—"within us and outside us, all around us"—and to use it to forge a deeper understanding of ourselves and more honest connections with each other. While that can be difficult to do, Lamott argues that it's crucial, as "kindness towards others, beginning with myself, buys us a shot at a warm and generous heart, the greatest prize of all."

October Sermon Series: "Now What?!"

beginning October 8

First there were the 10 Commandments of the Hebrew Bible. Then Jesus came along and said there's really only one. What are we to do with this information? Furthermore, how do we apply these commands to our day-to-day living? Explore these questions and more with Rev. Beth during the month of October in her sermon series "Now What?!".



Spiritual Practices

Lectio Divina means "divine reading" in Latin. It's a method of opening oneself to what God is saying through scripture.

And, it's the first spiritual practice that your Spiritual Engagement Team would like to share with you and encourage you to try on your own.

The purpose of Lectio Divina is to connect with God through scripture by reading a passage four times with a different focus each time.

The first time: Read. Just read the passage with no preconceived ideas of what the passage should be about. What words or phrases jump out at you?

Second, Reflect. Read the same passage a second time reflecting more on the words or phrases that jumped out at you during your first reading. What is God saying to you through these words today?

Third, Respond. After a third reading, respond. Respond any way that is meaningful to you; prayer, journaling, doodling... What do you want to say to God?

Fourth, Rest. Read the scripture a final time and then Rest. Simply be silent, be still, breathe, and allow God to be present. What about the reading will stay with you?

Tips:

- Try randomly selecting a psalm or a reading from the daily readings page or this week's lectionary.
- Try reading aloud to help stay focused and notice what jumps out at you.
 - Try a familiar passage to see it in a new light.
- No worries! Try not to focus on doing this correctly or forcing an outcome. Any time spent reading scripture and with God is time well spent.

CSCC Cabinet Meeting - Minutes September 20, 2023 at 7pm *** DRAFT ***

The meeting was called to order at 7:08 by Anne Malmquist, Moderator.

Cabinet members in attendance: Anne Malmquist, Moderator; Rev. Beth Stotts, Pastor; David Sheibley, Treasurer; Diane Sheibley, Clerk; Terry Reynolds, Community Engagement Team; John Sharland, Property and Finance Team

Diane Sheibley took attendance. Quorum was met.

Rev. Beth opened the meeting with a devotion and a prayer.

August Minutes

The meeting minutes from the August meeting were presented and reviewed. John Sharland motioned to accept the minutes as written; Rev. Beth seconded. The minutes were approved as written.

Pastor's Report – Rev. Beth Stotts

Rev. Beth thanked all who helped her and her family during her recent sick leave and surgery. She worked with the Spiritual Engagement Team on updating the child protection policy. She has been working with the Community Engagement Team on their projects, especially the service trip next summer. She noted how she loved the August worship format. She worked on updating the church brochure, and ordered copies. She has been researching fundraising and networking opportunities, and connected with a grant writer. There is a book discussion on October 29.

Treasurer's Report – David Sheibley

Dave reported that last month wasn't great for income, but we're still averaging out OK. He took \$10k out of investments, which was the first time in about 5 months that he had to do so.
