It's been sung by the Byrds. It's a scripture that many don't realize is a scripture. But as the calendar turns from 2023 to 2024 it's a good time to remember that there is a time for every season under heaven.

Recall these words from Ecclesiastes 3:1-8.

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: 2a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; 3a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; 4a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; 5a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; 6a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; 7a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; 8a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace."

As we begin 2024, I want to invite us into new seasons.

On January 7th in worship, we will welcome the New Year and begin the season of Epiphany. We will worship, we will ponder, we will pay attention, we will discern, and our spirits will grow. Through it all, I long for us to embrace that we will all be changed in our time together, that together we will laugh and dance, and we might just weep and throw away. I want us to always love one another, and recognize that there may be times when we do not love what the other is doing. It's a

time for us to search for things and a time to let go of other things. In this time ahead of shared ministry, we can know that our God is with us through it all!

A little later in the 3rd chapter of Ecclesiastes, the poet/philosopher/ writer has this to say: "So I perceived that there was nothing better for human beings but to enjoy what they do because that's what they're allotted in life. Who, really, is able to see what will happen in the future?" [verse 22]. We can't know what the future will hold for us, but I hope you will join together as we share in ministry and look forward to the future God is inviting us to. Even though we don't exactly know what the future holds, I know that together, God is going to do amazing things at Central Square Congregational Church, UCC in the coming days, weeks, months, years, and decades!

My Thoughts on Three Wise Men

When Reverend Beth sent me the scripture verses for the month of January, I looked at them and felt stumped. I am no



biblical scholar. What could I possibly say that might help tie the words in Matthew to anything that might have any relevancy to today? I was intimidated. I felt foolish for offering to write for the newsletter on a regular basis. Who am I? I felt scared because I was trying to offer up my time and talent (writing) to our community and I was coming up with nothing to say. All I have been thinking about lately is the role that kindness should play in a Christian life, but that doesn't have anything to do with Matthew 2:1-12. Or does it?

There are lots of ways a person can show kindness. Fred Rogers, of *Mister Roger's Neighborhood* was a very kind man by all accounts. He spent his career using his kindness to teach children that they were special, unique human beings that deserve to love themselves. Princess Diana is also known around the world for her extraordinary acts of kindness. Before her tragic death in 1997, she contributed to more than 100 charities during her lifetime. She never hesitated to show kindness, by helping the homeless, AIDS patients, people with leprosy, and children with cancer.

The way that the three wise men showed their kindness was by not reporting back to King Herod about Jesus' location as they were asked to do. Their act of kindness was in NOT doing something. We aren't told in scripture how much this may have inconvenienced the three wise men, but one can assume it probably did in many ways. Perhaps there was a reward for leading King Herod to Jesus. Perhaps returning to their homelands required traveling a significantly longer route than originally planned, which would require more provisions, to avoid King Herod. Perhaps by not reporting back, the three wise men strained relations between King Herod and their home countries. We just don't know.

My point is that kindness frequently requires a willingness to accept the cost involved with doing the right thing. Being kind is not always about convenience, comfort or ease. It's a willingness to extend oneself to benefit another with no expectation of reward. It is accepting your own discomfort at times to help someone in need, refusing to extract the proverbial pound of flesh for your service.

So I'll remain in my fear. I will be scared and uncomfortable putting my thoughts in this newsletter in the hopes that I encourage even one person to make more of an effort to be kind in their day to day life. Because kindness matters.

Text Alerts


CSCC is updating its text alert system, and starting from scratch with a new provider (so even if you signed up under our former system, we need you to sign up again). Text messages are often a more efficient

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CSCC Cabinet Meeting - Minutes November 29, 2023 at 7pm

The meeting was called to order at 7:03 by Anne Malmquist, Moderator.

Cabinet members in attendance: Anne Malmquist, Moderator; Rev. Beth Stotts, Pastor; David Sheibley, Treasurer; Diane Sheibley, Clerk; Mark Sorgman and David Hanson, Property and Finance Team; Diane Glass, Community Engagement Team; Carol Chaffee, Congregational Engagement Team; Eric Stotts, Spiritual Engagement Team.

Diane Sheibley took attendance. Quorum was met.

Rev. Beth opened the meeting with a devotion and a prayer.

October Minutes

The meeting minutes from the October meeting were presented and reviewed. Carol Chaffee motioned to accept the minutes as written; Eric Stots seconded. The minutes were approved with minor corrections.

Pastor's Report - Rev. Beth Stotts

Rev. Beth was pleased to report that a meeting of all the Bridgewater clergy finally took place after a long time and several personnel changes. They will now be having lunch once a month. She did an obituary writing seminar at the senior center, and East Bridgewater senior center called and asked if she would do it for them. There has been a lot of Advent work. The Advent book study is on "A Christmas Carol," and all ages are welcome to participate in the discussion on Dec. 17. The Thanksgiving service was really nice but not very well attended, although BTV taped and streamed it. There was about a \$100 collection for the food pantry.

Treasurer's Report – Dave Sheibley

Receipts for October were better than those in September, and we're about \$3,000 higher than at this time last year. We raised about \$7,300 from the fair, with that total to be added to from Christmas on the Common sales. We raised about \$810 on the opera night concert.

Congregational Engagement Team – Carol Chaffee

Carol reported that Ginny Young has resigned from the Team leadership, and Kathleen Mosher had previously resigned, so Carol is the only one at this point. [If anyone would like to help plan upcoming events and projects for Congregational Engagement, contact Moderator Anne Malmquist, or Carol.] There will be a Christmas caroling event at Anne Chaffee's housing complex on Dec. 16, 4-6pm, organized by Carol and Marci Langevin. Diane will make a flyer to hand out at Kids Church to encourage participation. Poinsettias will be sold and in the sanctuary beginning Dec. 17. The former members of the History and Memorials Committee will be helping to organize. The Care Team has been reaching out to people on the mustard seeds list and updating the list that is published.

Community Engagement Team – Diane Glass

The Opera Night held earlier this month was a fun evening, and raised about \$800. Krissy is handling the Warmth in Cold Places project, and they will be distributing donated items on Dec. 18 in Taunton. Christmas on the Common is this Sunday, Dec. 3. Our bathrooms will be open for the public, and our crafters and jewelry folks will be selling items. Remember that the streets around the common will be closed and/or limited during that time.

Property & Finance Team – Mark Sorgman

Mark reported that the P&F Team met with two people who are willing to work on the fundraising committee, Lynn Pietras and Sandy Kuipers. If anyone has any fundraising ideas, send them to Mark and he'll pass them along. The committee

will be focusing on doing fundraising this year, not developing an overall plan. There is broken plexiglass on one of the stained glass windows. Many of the lights in the building were replaced with LEDs, which will be more efficient and cost-saving. It was arranged for through Mass Save. The P&F Team will be installing a lockbox for the office key, like those used by realtors. The code will be distributed to those who need to access the office during off hours.

Rev. Beth would like to pass the front walkway fundraising project to the fundraising committee. She has done a lot of research for it and can pass that along to them.

Spiritual Engagement Team - Eric Stotts

Kids Church during Advent has engaged in drawing poinsettias and writing letters for the homebound in our community. Krissy will be heading up the Heifer lessons for January. The living gift market is February 11. We have at least three teachers for Heifer, and we had three teachers for Advent. On Dec. 24, there won't be a pageant, but the kids will be helping to lead worship. Kids Church is also doing a toy drive to benefit the school Kathleen Mosher works for, the Cardinal Cushing school. They are coordinating with the girl scouts that use the building as well. Donation drop boxes will be inside the back door and at the thrift shop.

Ad Hoc Teams – Anne Malmquist

Anne noted that we need some "ad hoc" committees to help the teams, which was the vision of the new constitutional structure. We have folks working on fellowship time following worship, and on breakfast. We need ushers and greeters. Do we need a memorials committee? Deacons – we need to develop a new description to be able to get more people involved, remote members, too. Need to develop a talent database to engage individuals based on their interests.

Rev. Beth would like to work on developing a new directory.
