How do you get inspired?

Earlier this week a colleague said to me, "It's hard to feel inspired every single week. Inspired enough to write a sermon, week after week, month after month, year after year. Some weeks are hard. Some weeks are overwhelming. Some weeks you're sick. But the inspiration still has to show up at some point because at 10am on Sunday morning something inspiring has to come out of our mouths."

Inspiration can describe the process of being overcome by a spontaneous urge to do something creative or important. It can be that a-ha moment when the path forward becomes suddenly obvious to you. But inspiration is hard to make happen.

Coming from the Latin *inspirare*, meaning "to breathe into," the word *inspiration* was originally used in a divine context to mean a kind of mystical animating force, a profound idea or truth revealed to a person out of nowhere. As though the feeling itself were a bolt of lightning from a God. The peculiar feeling of being suddenly inspired by a new idea can seem random and unpredictable. But some scientists think that inspiration is the result of our minds processing new information in the context of things we already know, a lot like discovering a single jigsaw piece that connects two completed parts of a picture.

That means it's possible to encourage inspiration through your intentional actions, rather than waiting around for it to happen spontaneously. Here are some things I do to stay inspired:

- Pray to God
- Listen to music
- Read a book
- Sing
- Get physical activity
- Speak to people
- Watch a movie
- Visit a new place
- Dance

It's Budget Time!

April 15 is the due date for teams to get their budget info to the Treasurer, Dave Sheibley (treasurer@csccucc.com). With the new constitution, this year presents

an opportunity for change from what we've done in the past. In particular:

Income

If you have an INCOME line item that should be added to the 2024-25 budget, please submit it. Maybe it's a new fundraiser that is being planned. Remember that we have been running deficit budgets in recent years, which we can't sustain forever (see page 14). Do you and some friends have a new fundraiser you'd like to plan for the church in the next fiscal year? Or maybe there is a new component planned for an existing fundraiser. Let us know!

Expenses

In the past, we've often just listed the Boards and Committees as one line item each. But perhaps it's easier to plan, and decipher, more line items, this time by Team. For example, instead of just having "Spiritual Engagement Team" with a total dollar amount, they might prefer to have multiple line items that add up to the Team's total, such as:

- Kids Church
- Bible and book studies
- Youth Group
- Worship music/choir
- Altar/sanctuary décor and supplies
- Worship supplies and planning

The other teams may wish to have line items enumerated as well, to help keep things organized. Let Dave know what would work best for you. You can refer to the list of specific expenses that have been incurred so far this fiscal year, as well as the Team Handbook for reference for examples of what ministries fall under your individual Team.

All projects and ministries should report their budget needs to their teams, so that the teams can submit their budgets to the Treasurer by April 15.

Last month in Kids Church we focused on the season of Lent but also looked at the story of Abraham, Sarah, and the 3 visitors. We looked at that story

from two different perspectives. The first was the importance of names and how our actions define how people think about us when our name is said. The second Sunday we focused on how God changes us. The ability to look at a passage from two different perspectives and get two different things out of it is something that, as adults, I think we sometimes take for granted.

And yet, every year around February or March, I find myself drawn back to the words of Langston Hughes and his poem, "Let America be America Again". If you haven't read it, you need to. Every time I read it, it fills me with a swell of emotions.

"Let America be the dream the dreamers dreamed-Let it be that great strong land of love Where never kings connive nor tyrants scheme That any man be crushed by one above."

While the poem is not religious in nature, that line about love is something that is core to our beliefs as Christians. This idea of love, and the other lines that suggest we should all fundamentally be equal, is Jesus' message. And as the first line says, focusing on this idea of love and equality is aspirational and should be what we all strive for. But if you focused just on that message, you'd miss the point of the poem. The next line after this stanza is:

"(It never was America to me.)"

This back and forth between the narrator and the mysterious voice is talking to the oppression and how this

idealized and aspirational view of what America should be, could only be reached by some, and certainly not people of color in 1935. I was not around 89 years ago when this was written, but the theme of some people having power over others is still alive and well to this day be it money, or race, or class.

We cannot forget that the message of love and equality, and the fact that inequality exists even when we are striving to be our best selves, can both be true. So the ideas that (1) we make ourselves who we are; AND, (2) that God changes us and makes us who we are, are both important. This was one of our themes this past month in Kids Church. We tried putting it into words that 5-13 year olds could understand, but it can be both!

So the challenge from the Spiritual Engagement Team to the congregation this month is this:

Look up your favorite passage from the Bible. Read it several times until you are locked in on its meaning. Then read the passage before and after it. Does it change the meaning? Does it give it context?

The meeting was called to order at 7:07 by Anne Malmquist, Moderator.

Diane Sheibley took attendance. Quorum was met.

Rev. Beth opened the meeting with a devotion and a prayer.

January Minutes

The meeting minutes from the January meeting were presented and reviewed. Rev. Beth motioned to accept the minutes as written; Eric Stotts seconded. The minutes were approved as written.

Pastor's Report – Rev. Beth Stotts

Rev. Beth continues to give her obituary writing workshop to various groups. She also received a letter from Elaine Henriksen that she misses her church family, and cards are encouraged. Lent is going well, and the sleepover was fun. New members will be joining in the near future. The Lenten study group began today. Bruce Maclay fell and is in the hospital. Rev. Beth requested that the April Cabinet meeting be moved to April 24th due to school vacation week. (Agreed)

Treasurer's Report – Dave Sheibley

Dave reported that we are pretty much on budget, unfortunately, and noted that he hoped we would be doing better. The Thrift Shop is really proving to be a big help, and the fair did well. Breakfast is running at a deficit of about \$500, which isn't part of the budget. Investments are doing OK even though we've had to take money out for operations.

Community Engagement Team – Diane Glass

One Great Hour of Sharing offering will be on March 10. The food pantry is looking for volunteers for when their regular people can't be there. The Food Pantry is also in need of financial donations.

Congregational Engagement Team

The chowder-making event with Mary Barnsley went very well. Another food-making event is in the works.

Property & Finance Team – David Hanson

The team is happy to report that they got rid of the broken fan, the vacuum, the couch downstairs, and the tree branches outside. Snow removal was done recently by Nick Bagas. John Sharland is investigating unauthorized uses of the church that have been reported. Regarding the walkway out front that is in need of repair/replacement: the team might get a concrete cutter and just replace the broken parts for now. That will give time to develop a longterm plan. The plexiglass panels on the windows need to be replaced and measurements will soon be taken. Diane Sheibley asked when budget requests are due from the teams. David said he would talk to the team and get back to her.

Spiritual Engagement Team – Eric Stotts

Palms have been ordered. They need another source for the flower cross for Easter. Eric shared an open letter the team wrote to the church leadership. It suggested that we need to find ways to be inclusive of those wanting to contribute to the church with time and talent, without having the responsibility and commitment of a position of leadership. Kristi Ciaramitaro is going to be a junior deacon as of this Fall.

Communications – Diane Sheibley

Diane reminded everyone that we now have a text alert system, and encouraged everyone to sign up for occasional text messages for upcoming events as well as event cancellations.

Other Business

- Rev. Beth noted that 10 kids attended the sleepover, and all had a great time. They want to do more. The next one is tentatively scheduled for April vacation.
- There was a request for people to wear hats on Easter to worship.
- There was a renewed suggestion that everyone wear nametags on Sundays. Suggestions were entertained on how best to increase compliance with this.

The meeting adjourned at 8pm.

Pastor's Report - Rev. Beth Stotts

Lent is a busy time. Super Saturday was incredible. Rev. Beth began preparing for her July sabbatical. She will be exploring creating a WISE congregation (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged in the mental health of the community). There are 7 youth exploring confirmation. May 7 is confirmation Sunday. There are 3 prospective members joining the church on April 28. The palms for palm Sunday have arrived. All the Bridgewater clergy are participating in the sunrise service on March 31. The end of life workshop will be held on 3/30.

Treasurer's Report – Dave Sheibley

Last month's giving was less than the same month last year, but this month's is already ahead of last year. \$30,000 this fiscal year has been taken out of investments, but luckily the stock market is doing well.

Community Engagement Team – Krissy Cannizzo and Terry Reynolds

They reported that they are working on the budget request and annual report. They have been discussing ways they can bring in new volunteers. Rev. Beth asked if she can put a sign outside the side door asking for volunteers for the food pantry, from the food pantry patrons. (yes) It was suggested that they connect with the BSU professor who runs the community service class. We have had several students of that class come to us to volunteer.

Congregational Engagement Team - Carol Chaffee

There will be an event called "Tortellini with Frank" on April 27. It will be a class in making Frank Ciaramitaro's tortellini soup. Everybody will be able to take some home, and there will be some to share with others. 32 Easter lilies were sold! Carol asked what else falls under their budget. Diane looked at the Team Handbook, which lists "examples of current programs and projects" that fall under the Cong Engagement Team, namely Care Team, Care Circles, Extravagant Welcome, and Steeple Sounds. Dave Sheibley will also send list of the individual transactions from the current fiscal year to each team, as examples of what types of expenses they are responsible for.

Property & Finance Team - John Sharland

John noted that they put a thank you note for stewardship pledges in last month's Steeple Sounds, and last Sunday different ways of giving were discussed. They noted that there is a person at the Conference that could come and preach on stewardship (Rev. Beth said that person had been here once before to preach). Regarding the Sexton position, they were unsure as to when Rich is leaving. If anyone knows of anyone who might be interested in the position, refer them to the P&F Team. It's 15 hours a week.

They noted that the sacristy refrigerator has been given away. Ian Jackson came and reviewed the power situation in the lower level (food pantry), and fixed issues. The necessary steps to replace the plexiglass on some of the sanctuary windows are in process. David Ferrari has agreed to come and take care of the broken pieces in the concrete in the front of the church, for free, in May. When asked about fundraising, the team noted nothing is currently in process.

Spiritual Engagement Team - Eric Stotts

Rev. Beth has been conducting the Lenten Study. On Palm Sunday, the youth will hand out palms and have a special presentation. Flowers for the flower cross on Easter have been ordered.
