### From the Desk of Rev. Beth

I can't remember exactly when I was first introduced to Psalm 46, but I've been finding hope and comfort in its words for decades.

Whenever I feel unsettled or I'm stressed or worried, or when I stand in the world not knowing what to do next, I gravitate to the opening verses that provide encouragement: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change" (Psalm 46:1-2). There is comfort in these words; an acknowledgement that things can be wild and we can feel lost but there is truly nothing to fear. God is with us.

A verse that I've been thinking about as we've entered into the heart of Fall programming at the church is: "There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy habitation of the Most High" (v.4). It is a rich, intriguing verse, with a "river" serving as a metaphor for all that enables life to flourish in human community. As written in one commentary on Psalm 46, the river "alludes to the graces and consolations of the Holy Spirit, which flow through every part of the church... gladdening the heart of every believer". When I think about the life of our church, I very much imagine a river of spirit flowing throughout everything we do. I imagine the river of



spirit working through the Food Pantry, through the Thrift Shop, through the communion bread, through the fellowship-time conversations. The spirit is very much present in our community.

I hope this month we will all ponder the wonders of Psalm 46 and think of the gifts and graces of God which bring us joy and enliven the community we share. We are poised to proclaim the broader expression of the Christian gospel to the greater Bridgewater community. Our world desperately needs to hear the "good news" of God's ever-present love. Your contributions, whether pledged as time, talent, or treasure, work to "make glad the city". Your contributions are an expression of God's love. Thank you.





Two-thirds are used by Justice and Witness Ministries to provide grants to UCC churches and organizations as well as supporting a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects.
